

From the President

In reflecting on the events and achievements of 1995 there is much that has happened during the year for us to be very proud.

It was also a year which brought profound sadness to the organisation and the community as a whole when Prime Minister Yitzak Rabin was assinated in November, 1995. For those who attended the Maccabiah Games in Israel in 1993 who will ever forget the moving, closing ceremony and the message delivered by the late Prime Minister to those who were present in Jerusalem 'the Maccabiah is a unique phenomena - a phenomena of Jewish solidarity, sport, commitment to the faith of the Jewish people and devotion to Israel'.

The Maccabi movement was regarded as a most important link by the late Prime Minister between Israel and the Diasproa and in his words we must 'earry the message' of the continuity of Jewish history in the city of Jerusalem.

Victoria Maccabi continues to play a critical role in the vital area of maintenance of Jewish continuity and awareness through our sporting, cultural and social activities. Many of our 2,500 active members throughout 28 afiliated clubs, rely very much, in some cases solely, on Maccabi for their contact and connections within our community.

1995 has seen further gains being made in consolidating Maccabi as a significant organisation within the community and playing a most important role in the area of communal affairs.

December 1995 saw the establishment of the Jewish Community Planning and Development Board, being a key recommendation in the report of the Commission for the Future. It is certainly a milestone for the organisation that Victoria Maccabi was invited to be an inaugural member of the Board, which will have a most significant role to play in the future to set the agenda and assess the priorities for the community leading into the year 2000.

At the grass roots level however, there are still some very serious concerns. While many of our affiliated clubs have been able to adjust to rapidly changing social and financial conditions, there are a number of clubs struggling financially and lacking in resources. On a positive note, there has been some great highlights and achievements during 1995.

1995 Highlights

Junior Carnival

The 13th Junior Maccabi Carnival saw a team of over 250 travel to Sydney under the hard working and able leadership of Abe Berman backed by a team of very committed assistants. The Carnival was an outstanding success.

Victoria Maccabl's commitment to Junior Carnival and its present format is reflected by the decision by the executives to host the 14th Junior Carnival in Melbourne in January, 1996. By the time this yearbook goes to print, the Carnival will be in full swing and the 700 participants will be indulging in traditional Melbourne hospitality.

Senior Carnival

Approximately 130 competitors attending the 62nd Carnival in Perth under the excellent leadership of Sam Parasol and his assistants, Lisa Borowick and Julian, Isaacs, Tony Aarons and David Parasol.

Auction Night

The annual Maccabi Auction Night at Leonda has become a most popular evening with our members and, once again, was an outstanding financial and social success this year. The attractiveness of the venue is a major factor in the success of the event and we are very grateful for the support we continue to receive from the Spotless Group in making Leonda available and from Peter Unger, whose support for Maccabi is outstanding. Fanny Abrahami, once again, put in a huge effort to make the evening a success and she led a very competent and committed team of workers. In 1996, we will be looking for an alternative format to continue to make the evening as popular and attractive as ever.

Around the Clubs

In 1995 we witnessed some outstanding highlights and, without wishing to detract from many noteworthy highlights around the clubs, particular reference is made to the following:

 The senior mens volleyball team were successful in winning the state league A grade premiership, which is as good as it gets.

Simon Yudelevich represented Australia at the Asian championships and won a bronze medal.

- In junior football, the Ajax under 15 team had anothergreat year and won back to back premicrships. The team was guided through the year by Glen Coleman and we look forward to many members of the team continuing their commitment through into the senior ranks.
- The Maccabi table tennis team fielded an A grade pennant team for the first time ever.
- The spectacular growth which has been achieved by the basketball club in previous years continued and the basketball club has now probably the largest membership of any of the affiliated clubs.
- The Ajax senior football club finalised plans to return to Albert Park in 1996 with completion of the leasing arrangements for the oval and new pavilion which will provide a magnificent venue for the Club and Maccabi in the years ahead.

Community Centre Sub-Committee

Probably the most active sub-committee during the year was the Community Centre Sub-Committee which has been assessing the needs of the organisation and the affiliated clubs. The sub-committee investigated a number of different proposals owich came forward during the year. For various reasons, none of the proposals considered have been acceptable. There is a great challenge for the subcommittee to make further progress in planning towards providing a long term home for the organisation and rationalisation of the facilities for communal sporting and social use.

Conclusions

I wish to place on record my sincere thanks and gratitude for the dedicated support that I have received from all members of the executive during the year. In particular, Vice President, Sam Parasol and Harry Procel continue to show their commitment to Maccabi at the highest level. Having regard to their other communal responsibilities and in Harry's case, taking on the Chairmanship of the Maccabiah Organising Committee, Victoria Maccabi can be very proud that it has people as dedicated as Sam and Harry in the success and welfare of the organisation.

Finally, I wish to record my deep appreciation to our Executive Director, Paul Bronstein and his office staff who has worked tirelessly for the organisation and, once again, is responsible for producing this outstanding yearbook. The continued support of our major sponsors, donors and advertisers in making the yearbook possible is also gratefully acknowledged. Ian Davis

1995 has been a year of significant achievement and progress for Victoria Maccabi and we have been able to sow new seeds for the future. Several goals were set and many of these objectives were achieved largely due to the support of the Board of Management of Victoria Maccabi.

The involvement of new blood to the roof body and its sub-committees has added impetus to our organisation and has opened doors to new and positive initiatives which we hope to develop both in 1996 and the future.

Senior Carnival

Sam Parasol led the team to Western Australia last year as he will to the Gold Coast 1995/96. Sam, ably assisted by Lisa Borowick, has involved Tony Aarons, Julian Isaacs and David Parasol as assistant team managers. All three have come through our Youth Leadership Program and I expect them to become involved at board level in the future.

Junior Carnival

Abe Berman did a great job as team manager, taking a team of 350 to Sydney in early 1995 where all present had a wonderful social and sporting holiday. In 1996 Michael Sput has been appointed team manager and has enrolled several new faces at team management level. Alan Silver heads the Carnival Organising Committee and has also surrounded himself with many new faces.

Community Centre Project

Following the loss of 97 Aima Road, the affiliated clubs met at a forum late last year to investigate the feasibility of a new Maccabi home. The outcome was the formation of a community centre sub-committee. The following people have been instrumental in getting the committee up and running and hopefully in my report next year I can announce a community centre launch. The committee consists of: M Sput, H Procel, J Borensztajn, S Parasol, I Davis, J Hoppe, J Aarons, P Weinman, R Morley, B Blau, L Zalzberg, L Haskin and myself.

Fundraising

Victoria Maccabi, as a roof body, continually strives to develop new fundraising initiatives and provide new vehicles to assist clubs in their fundraising objects. The purpose of fundraising is twoidd; to raise funds to support our affiliated clubs, and to keep the Maccabi Office running. The Auction Cabaret, Footy Tipping Competition and Melbourne Cup Rafle were the main vehicles for 1995 and for those who were involved 1 would like to thank them for their support.

The Footy Tipping Competition

This year proved very exciting with five people alive coming to the finals series and two, Allen Brostek and Louis Cukierman surviving to the Grand final. You only had to pick one winner per round and in the Grand Final both Louis and Allen picked Geelong. So they split first and second prize and each received \$900. Equal third and fourth and fifth were Ian Bejer, Mark Klapish and B Gormley.

Auction Cabaret at Leonda

This is Victoria Maccabi's Night of Nights where all clubs, members and supporters are invited to get together in a social environment, while raising substantial funds at the same time.

The entertainment was first class. Robert Weil was brillant as a New York Rabbi, Ray Black and Russell Shayer did the Cooke and Moore one legged Tarzan skit. Jonathan Feder sang like Anthony Warlow and Segal and Class Sang and played music as members of the audience dined the night away. Co-ordinator of the night, Fanny Abrahami, was instrumental in ensuring a good time was had by all. She was ably assired by Lisa Borowick.

Maccabi Masters

- To select committees and sub-committees eg., Junior Carnival, Senior Carnival, fundraising events.

Some specific roles of the Maccabi Office are: Clubs and sub committees utilise the office for their meetings.

- · For Registration and Sign on Days
- · For ring arounds.
- · For working bees and preparation for events.
- · For collating and mail outs.
- Photocopying, typing and other administrative services.
- Preparation of entry forms, membership forms.
- Source of information for the general public, eg., how to join a club, what clubs are available, contact numbers, venues, ages etc.

Since the move to Hawthorn Road in 1994, the Maccabi office has proved to be very convenient with the Boardroom being heavily utilised by the Maccabi Clubs and the sub-committees. The office is operating more efficiently and this would be impossible to achieve without the backup support of Edna Silver as secretary and Les Jason and several other people who freely volunteer their time.

1995 Winter Season

Junior Girls

The solution was to play the girls' teams in the Under 9 boys competition. The girls teams played competitively against the boys and almost made the finals in their very first season. All in all 4 teams made it to the Finals. The Under 11 Magics were runners up in their Grand Final and the Tigers and Gold teams played against each other in the Under 13 Grand Final. The Maccabi Gold Under 13 team won to become the first ever premiership team for the Maccabi girls at Waverley. In the Under 15s the Tigers finished third in a strong Division 1 competition losing the Preliminary final with a team of only 5 players that had become depleted by illness and injury by the end of the season. Senior Men

The Division 2 side had never played together before and lost the first 6 games. Nevertheless they improved significantly as the season wore on to finish 9th on the ladder out of 24 sides.

Junior Boys

11 teams played in the Waverley competition, 1 Under 9, 3 Under 11s, 5 Under 13s, 1 Under 15 and 1 Under 17, and 8 teams at Albert Park,

At Waverley, 5 teams reached the Finals matches. The Under 9 boys were undefeated all season and played in the Grand Final in their first ever season of basketball. The Under 11 The third side played in a different competition on Monday nights and this team, without a coach, won the C-grade Premiership by defeating Elitzur in a close Grand Final.

The teams have met with mixed success, however as the season progressed the results improved dramatically. The players and parents have shown enormous enthusiasm. This year there were a number of new coaches and interviews are now being conducted for appointment of coaches for 1996. As a result of work undertaken by Boris Seroshtan (the coach of the under 14 side) in the Jewish Day School system we believe there is going to be a significant increase in the numbers of players. Boris has started a summer training program and the whole of the under 15 and under 16 teams are participating together with approximately another 25 players from various age groups. It is hoped that general skill levels will improve dramatically as a result of the summer training. Boris has been appointed coaching coordinator for 1996 and is participating in the selection process of coaches.

The VSF has specified minimum standards of coaching qualifications for 1996. This is the first time there has been any minimum specification for junior coaching. The Club has been liaising with the director of junior coaching at the Victorian Soccer Federation in order to improve the training and skills program.

1995 also saw the Club become affiliated with Victoria Maccabi. This has been a bonus for the Club as it has made available the Maccabi Sports Club's resources.

At the recent Annual General Meeting several new faces were appointed to the Committee. They are Bruce Esterman, Gary Esterman and John Landes. Peter Sackville continues as Treasurer for another year and Rob Wyner and Michael Lowinger are the two Vice Presidents. Cela Sapar who has been a stalwart of the Club for many years is looking to wind down her activities however, she will assist with a transition to a new Secretary. Registrations for 1996 will take place on 11 and 18 February 1996. Rob Wyner has been coordinating junior soccer for Junior Carnival and also players are now being groomed for the Maccabiah games in 1997. It is hoped that there will be Victorian Soccer representatives at The Maccabiah Games which has been lacking in recent years.

The Club is looking forward to the future.

Ajax enters the 1995/96 season in a uniquely quanderous situation, having had its home ground and training facility temporarily taken away by the construction of the Grand Prix facility at Albert Park. As such the club is now training and playing its home matches in Gaulfield for the duration of 1995/96. The early indications have shown that being located in Gaulfield may be beneficial to the long term future of the club with player training numbers swelling to levels far in excess of previous seasons.

It would seem sensible that the combined side with its sheer size would guarantee the future of Jewish cricket for some time. But both clubs have made great achievements on their own, each providing a Niche' attraction, each with a proud history all of which could be sacrificed in a merger. Talks continue in a most convivial manner between the Clubs.

On the field, Ajax continues to field two Agrade senior teams and a total of four senior teams and four junior teams. The Juniors, through the great work of their convenor Jack Cooper have secured Caulfield Park for their home fixtures. Being at Caulfield Park should allow for more parental involvement, something the junior management so desperately needs.

On the field, Sam Frey was appointed captain of the first XI, a reward for his excellent season 94/95 where he won the 1st XI Batting Award and the Club Championship. Ray Montag will captain the Second XI as well as taking on the Club Presidency after Mark Simon stepped down from this post. Gideon Segal captains the thirds and Jeff Israel leads the fourths for the third consecutive year.

The annual dinner was, again , a most enjoyable and successful Function. Major award winners were - Mark Fine (Cricketer of the Year), Sam Frey (Club championship, Most Improved and Most Consistent), David Gelbart (Most Determined), Leon Jacobs (Most dedicated), Simeon Goldenberg (Best Clubman) and Ben Fisher (Junior Cricketer of the Year).

The Club saw the retirement of one of its great legend Steve Sandor last season, a player who has given many years great service to Ajax. Steve will this year take on a full time position with the Victorian Cricket team as their team Physiotherapist. The club is proud to note that former junior star Michael Klinger has gained selection for the Victorian Under 17 side as well as Prahran 2nd XI and we wish him well in his pursuits to reach the highest level of the game.

Joe Silver has returned to coach the club in an honorary position, something everyone at the Club is extremely grateful to Joe for.

The club acknowledges with appreciation its close ties with Victoria Maccabi, Northern Maccabi and the Ajax Football Club.

Batting second last season against East Doncaster, only new Vice Capitani, Justin Lipton stood up in the face of some hostile bowling and even his valour couldn't see the side through to the Grand Final.

While ex captain and club legend, Mike Zemski, was out injured that day, it was a disappointing day for many of the up and coming players. Marc Felman and David Freund each had impressive debut seasons, scoring their maiden centuries and at one time sharing in a 156 run partnership against Kew. In the bowling, Allan Sheffield and Allan Landau were exceptional recruits for the club, taking many wickets between them. Landau is also seen as a potential all rounder with his powerhouse batting talents, while club stalwart, Richard Lustig found a new lease of life with his crafty leg spin bowling, winning the bowling averages in the First XL.

The Second XI also looks forward to another finals appearance in season 1995-96. Last season the spine of its batting was Anthony Langley, the affable opener. Always keen for a joke, and often having those around him in tears with his razor-sharp wit, Langley enjoys a fine record with the Second XI, as he scored 103 and 64 in successive weeks, his 64 coming in the semi-final and proving a vital knock.

Off the field, the Committee, while inexperienced, is passionate about forging an identity for the club within the competition. While a premiership has cluded the club for many years, with its new-found depth this season, there is much promise.

So as the new dawn slowly creeps above the horizon, spreading its light across the universe, etching carefully onto the cricket pitches of the Eastern suburbs, from Northern Maccabi there emanates a special glow. For in their clubrooms at Wilson's Road in Doncaster the powers that be are still awake, quietly discussing season 1995-56 collectively analysing the potential, thoughtfully constructing spirit, soul and....er..and having an all-in-brawh because they can't agree on a theme song.

The Maccabi Health and Fitness Club is one of the oldest clubs under the Maccabi umbrella.

The AJAX Gym Club was formed and founded in 1924 to cater for Carlton's Jewish teenage population. It originally offered gymnastics and wrestling and later added boxing to its activities.

In the early fifties the club moved to St Kilda and eventually catered for ages from 5 years old upward. By the mid 60% club members could avail themselves of body building, weight lifting, judo, general fitness as well as the original boxing, wresting and gymnastics.

The success of the club was due to the dedication of those listed as life members at the beginning of this article.

Thirty years on, things have certainly changed and now a dedicated band of members makes up the renewed club. Since Bill Abromwich stepped down from the instructorship of the club, professional instructors have been supervising the gym sessions.

They vary from sedentary workers who want to exercise to sportsmen who need variety in their training. Thus, people of a wide range of fitness levels are cattered for. During the school holidays members are welcome to bring their children to club sessions.

We are not a competitive club. The emphasis is on members taking part in the program of exercises and enjoying themselves as well. The weekly sessions usually consist of just under an hour of exercises followed by a social game of volleyball.

Over the past two years, the weekly sessions have been supervised by Mark Withers who is a qualified instructor. Mark teaches at Mt Scopus and is involved in other sporting and training activities. Thanks to the excellent program of exercises provided by Mark, there has been a noticeable improvement in the fitness levels of the regular attendees at club sessions this year. Mark has been able to generate a lot of enthusiasm among club members.

As an experiment the club continued sessions throughout the summer holidays. This had a limited success and we will continue this at the end of this year.

We are still seeking new members and all newcomers will receive a warm welcome.

VICTORIA MACCABI INDOOR SPORTS CLUB

ESTABLISHED 1995

The idea of an indoor sports club was hatched at the last carnival in Perth over the summer of 1994/95. With Victorian teams in mixed netball, beach volleyball, indoor soccer and indoor cricket all performing admirably, with many victories and the sports becoming more and more popular at each carnival, establishing a home base in Melbourne for these sports became a priority. Adding mixed basketball took us up to five different sports on offer and a club was born.

Across Australia, indoor sports have been growing at a rapid rate and the number of participants amongst the Jewish Community is no exception. Our first priority was to find a home. As many of us were already playing at Action Cricket Moorabbin, where we knew the management and staff who had previously provided uniforms and equipment to our indoor cricket team, it became a logical choice for a home base. The new facilities, at 100 Gochranes Road Moorabbin, include 4 indoor courts plus a beach volleyball court and a bar.

The next step was to find enthusisatic and committed members to establish a committee. Many of these people have become involved in running a club for the first time and have shown to be adept and committed not only to this club, but to the Maccabi ideals instilled in all of us involved in the organisation.

In the space of five months, the club has already won two premicriships and been runners up on three further occasions. In finishing second, Maccabi managed to gain a reputation as a most feared opponent in 1995 and it hammered some quality opposition including Flemington - away from home 7-2, with Andrew Freund on fire that day with a fine hat-trick.

Other highlights for the year included the emergence of two young 16 year old players that have come through the junior ranks in Gay Benaharon and Oran Harel - both of whom managed to hold down regular senior places in the latter half of the season.

Gary Bailison also had a magnificent season and managed to make the right full-back position his own in 1995.

Whilst a number of players performed excellently in 1995, it was still difficult to maintain player depth, especially in training and to focus players on improving their skills and fitness levels to a higher standard.

The greatest challenge the club has is to try and entice young players in the 16-22 age bracket that this sport has a lot to offer them as the worlds major sport – as it is from this age group that future talent and depth must be gained.

Undoubtably, the lowest point of the season was the game against Oakleigh UTD. Away from home, in which a number of our players were injured in an anti-semitic brawl after the game. Six senior players found themselves confronted by about twenty Oakleigh UTD. Players, spectators and officials armed with batons and knives in the dressing room after the game from which several of our players emerged seriously injured both physically and psychologically.

It proved to be one of the ugliest incidence ever witnessed by anyone every connected with the Maccabi Soccer Club.

Another issue which continued to plague the club was the issue of playing Saturdays or Sundays.

In regards to this issue, the club made a point at the start of the season that it was going to respect the Shabbath and all Jewish Holidays no matter what the consequences were going to be.

Whilst the club was able to pursued the Victorian Soccer Federation of its religious argument for placing on Sundays only during the season, the club ran into the Federation head on when it came to playing the end of season play-offs for promotion at the end of the season which was scheduled for Saturdays only.

Unfortunately, Maccabi was forced to withdraw from the play-offs over the playing day issue after doing its utmost to get the Federation to change its intransigent policy and therefore forfeited its right to try and gain a promotion place to the second division in 1996.

This left many players and officials of the club very demoralised after having fought off three teams for the second spot in its League.

The playing day issue continues to be one major issue that the Victorian Soccer Federation and Maccabi have been at loggerheads over for many years and with neither side moving from its stated positions it is an issue that will continue to be argued in 1996.


So all in all a good year on the field with some major incidents off it.

The club is confident of continuing to grow and improve in future years backed by an unprecedented commitment to junior development and is continually striving to improve its community and player support.

The Maccabi reserves team emerged from 1995 in fifth position after having its playing strength drained by the seniors on several occasions.

The highlight of the year was a magnificent 1-0 victory over Wantirna UTD who were undefeated all season until losing in both reserves and seniors to a spirited Maccabi side.

The Maccabi Squash Club continues to be one of the strongest squash clubs in Melbourne, fielding three state grade sides along with 14 teams in the Southern District and two teams in the Club Circuit competitions.

The Club relocated at the beginning of the year to the Gardenvale Squash Centre, following the closure of its former home Leggetts in Prahran. This is the clubs third home base in as many years, but it has returned to its home, 97 Alma Road centre in 5K Kilda when the club was re admitted to the club circuit competition. It is hoped that the centre management at 97 will allow the club to field four teams for the next season in 1996.

AJAX SWIMMING CLUB

In the 1994-95 season AJAX Swimming Club officially changed its name to AJAX Maccabi Swimming Club to coincide with the State, National and World Organisations. The year has been a successful, the second in a five year plan the the Swimming Club hopes will develop and produce quality Jewish swimmers at Club, District, State and possibly National Jevels.

The highlight of the year was the very successful victorian Jewish Swimming Championships held at the State Swimming Centre last April. Over 190 competitors, including swimmers from NSW, took part in the yearly event which caters for swimmers 6 years to Open including Mothers, Fathers and Family races.

There were a number of bright new stars that took a step forward at the championships, Jarod Kagan, Melisas Fein, Joshua Grokop, Dora Banyasa and Brent Lukava all dominated theira age-groups and look ready to continue to improve their times as the vear progresses. Next vear's Championships will be held on March 31, 1996 at the State Swimming Centre: The club is anticipating over 200 competitors at what will be the biggest gathering of Mastrilan Jewish Swimmers in a long time.

The Swim Club took a team of five swimmers and two adults to Sydney for the New South Wales Jewish Championships in May 1995. This was the first Victorian Jewish swimming team to travel to these championships in 10 years. All of the Victorian wall ther (PB) intrast, Show Wales Fein's wan in the Cirk 14 years 50m Backstroke stood out as the highlight of the meet. She smashed an 11 year old record by over a second. The team that consisted of Mark Roach, Tim Krivitsky, Jarrod Kagan, Melissa Fein and Lisa Paneth were all in the of four placegetters in their events. Most importantly everybody had a great time in and out importantly everybody had a great time in and out South Wales swimmers started a relationships that will hopefully last a long time. Back for more next year? You can bet on it.

The Swimming club took part in the annual Spring Pennant Interchul competition in October and November. Over 30 juniors between the ages of 8 and 12 joined forces to compete against other Victorian swim clubs in an all relay round robin event. AIAX fielded three Junior teams (B-Grade, E-Grade and G-Grade) and one Senior team (Cgremicship as they did 2 years ago, the spirit and determination shown by verybody was encouragine.

The club's uniform took shape this year. Blue and black bathers, blue silicon swim caps and newly designed T-Shirts were made available for the Spring Pennant season. The swimmers looked and acted like a united team in their new gear, clearly the most vocal group in the swimming complex. A matching tracksuit is in the pipeline for early next war to complete the Swimming Club's uniform.

In July, for the first time since the late 1970's, AIAX invited Waverley Swim Club to the Mount Scopus pool for an invitational swim meet. AJAX showed their quality winning the inaugural 1990's AJAX v Waverley Trophy by 49 points after leading by only 6 at the halfway mark and being outnumbered by Waverley almost 2 to 1. The club also held two Open Carnivals during the year. These carnivals catered to all ages, across all strokes and distances ranging from 25m to 200m. These meets still continue to be a source of race practice and time trials for those swimmers who only get a chance to be in the water during training and lessons.

AIAX started a morning training squad at Caulified Grammar School in August and despite the interest generated initially, training had to halted at the start of November due to lack of attendance. It appears that parents would like their children to participate in an AIAX swin Chlu run training squad. Under coach and Maccabiah 1500m Bronze medallist Andrew Mayer the club is now searching for an aftermoon training alternative due to commence in early 1996.

Jarrod Kagan was the AJAX swimmer of the year. Jarrod came through eliminations and semi-finate to finish such in the Boys 11 years 50m Butterfly at the All Junior competition. He just missed the final and came inth in the State Sportn Championships in the same event and finished 12th in the Boys 11 yes 100m Butterfly in his first Victorian Swimming Championships, Hopefully, Jarrod can go on to bigger and better things in the coming year.

Melisas Fein was the sole AJAX Swimming Club representatives selected in the Maccabiah Games training squad. Melisas is training up to five times per week at the moment in her quest for final Maccabiah squad selection in the 1996/97 season. A preliminary squad was announced mid-year to assist potential qualifying swimmers in setting long and short term goals. The squad will be seeking to raise funds for training camps and the final trip to Israel in 1997.

The Club held successful fund raisers during the year. The movie Apollo 13 with Tom Hanks was the most popular event with the Cadbury's chocolate driver not far behind. As at the date of writing a Bingo Night is to be held soon in what we hope will provide the club with the ever necessary funds.






In the Stephen Rose Memorial Trophy (U16 singles), Danny Stuk defeated Adam Steinhardt. Social Events:





AJAX VOLLEYBALL CLUB

To say that 1995 was an eventful year for the Ajax Volleyball Cub is somewhat of an understatement. It was a year of departures and arrivals, mergers and acquisitions, a year of controversy and sentimentality and finally and most important of all, a year of results.

The increasing popularity of volleyball in its various forms, indoor, beach, indoor beach, saw a flood of interested players at the start of the season. Ajax settled to five representative teams, two Men's two Women's and a junior team.

Simon Yudelevich transferred from Footscray Renegades to Ajax, and Sydney based Mike Fischl, star of the NSW Gold Medal winning team, decided to make Melbourne his Volleyball home and committed to flying down most weekends to play with Ajax.

The new look Ajax started the year with spectacular results, surprising even the more optimistic of the club brains trust. Ajax won the Stare League pre-season invitational in Honours Division, with a thrilling 5 set win in the grand final over East Side Hawks. Having bearen some of the top clubs in the state. Ajax was guaranteed a place in State League for the 1995 season. In fact, the result iso impressed the Victorian Volleyball League that they put Ajax into Division One.

Ajax's passage through the season proved that the tournament was not a one off. The bonus addition of Yudelevich and Fischl was supplemented by rookies Andrew Rotstein and Paul Rosenberg who made the step up to senior grade, taking responsibility for vacated positions. Mike Fox proved that you don't have to start young to play volleyball well and setter Peter Bleecher showed that you can be over the hill and still climb the mountain. Peter Haskin combed the back court with ferocity and Perry Cohen was jumping like he did at the start of his career, 17 years ago. all rounder Ron Pila missed a month of season but returned to be the star of the final rounds and Gary Sokolov and Stuart Collins were important contributors, providing stability and depth.

Ajar finished the season on top of the ladder but suffered a crushing defeat by highly fancied Heidelberg in the first semi final, losing the double chance. Proof of the increasing maturity of the team was evident in their business like approach to recovering their composure and focusing on the premienship. Ajax did not lose a set in either the preliminary or grand final, defeating Heidelberg in the grand final remarch. The Stage League One premienship completed the hat-trick, adding to the minor premiership and pre-season tournament win. The win has put Ajax up againson which is the highest standard of volleyball played in the state and would see Ajax up agains the top 7 teams in Victoria.

Russian Ilya Svedlar filled the coaching position at the start of the year but retired due to family commitments. The remainder of the season saw the coaching role distributed amongst key club members. Club partiarch Norm Eisenberg with the assistance of specialist coach Serge Mezhov managed match preparation and on court coaching while captain Blecher and Simon Yudelevich ran the training sessions. The club plans to appoint a coach for the coming season in the lead up to the 1997 Maccabiah Games.

The year included some personal highlights for outstanding junior Danny Skrabal and Simon Yudelevich. Seventeen year old Skrabal was selected in the state U17 squad and played a number of state league games with the Ajax senior team. Yudelevich was invited to represent Australia at a prestigious International Beach Volleyball tournament in Hong Kong where the team finished fourth.

Ajax was also the only team to field two teams in the Australian Masters tournament held in Melbourne over the Easter break. The 30+ team, made up of club legends Neal "The Chief" Cohen, "Leaping" Len Kipen and the more senior of the men's state league team, performed admirably, finishing fourth overall. The 40+ team, led by Norm Eisenberg included some of the clubs founding members.

As many as five junior players trained with the Victorian U17 development team (Dean Escheberg, Mark Mandel, Gnady Kleiner, Ben Preiss and Danny Skrabal) with Danny Skrabal being selected for the squad. The promise shown by these players will be realised by the club in the years to come. The team was managed, coached and chauffeured by Norm Eisenberg who also made his comeback this year.

The senior women's team were forced to drop down to State League Division 3 mid-season due to study commitments of club champion Sara Zeev and injury to ning star Jackie Rudzki. The team comprising, Tori Goldberg, Ray Moss, Julie Lang, Simone Rubenstein, Jane Davis, Michelle Miller, Sharon Beaconsfield and Judy Kohn teamed well taking an equal share of wins and losses throughout the season.

The club celebrated its 25th Anniversary at the presentation night on 10th December this year.

Financially, the club has performed well largely due to the success of the men's State League team. Inspired by the teams performance new sponsor LOFERA Gas Cookers funded the acquisition of new playing tops for the club and prize money from Championship wins was gleefully banked by club treasurers Julie Lang and Gary Sokolov.

Socially, the volleyball club continues to be roaring success with no less than three volleyball weddings this year. Tournaments have also proven to be a popular social event, providing a mix of intense competition and equally intense partying.

The club is likely to continue to train at Melbourne High School on Monday nights in the new year with new members assured of a warm welcome.

The State League Three (SL3) team - having lost several players to work commitments, wives and babies - found itself lacking several of the key players that enabled them to achieve SL3 standard.









