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CARNIVAL TIME IN PERTH

Some 450 people will be arriving in Perth on December 25 to compete in the 52nd Australian Maccabi Sports Carnival. Despite previous reports of non-attendance we have confirmation from many top grade competitors that they will definitely be competing in Perth. This means that there will be good and strong competition which will make for exciting viewing.

The Perth community has once again opened their hearts and homes and despite the fact that many people have gone away for the holidays, 160 people will be staying in private homes. The rest of our visitors have chosen to stay at various of Perths many Hotels.

Carnival time in Perth is action time for young and old, with many activities from which to choose. From the time that the teams arrive till the time they depart on January 6th the carnival programme offers maximum enjoyment and participation for those involved in a sport or those wishing merely to watch.

The opening ceremony promises to be a Gala occasion and all the community has been invited to attend . . . 7.00 p.m. at the Maccabi grounds December 25th.

The Carnival Welcome is to be held at 8.00 p.m. at the Jewish Centre immediately after the opening ceremony. This is the first ticket function and those without season tickets will have to pay an entry fee of \$5.00. The carnival manager Mr David Saunders wishes to invite the presidents of all Jewish organisations in Perth to attend the Carnival Welcome as the guests of the manager and his committee.

SOCIALLY . . . Perth has got a reputation, in this case a very good one, one which will be enhanced by the activities arranged for this carnival. There is a superb balance of organised functions with ample time for, what are now quite famous, spontaneous carnival parties. Time has also been allowed for the visitors to get to see and enjoy some of Perth and it's environs.

The Jewish centre will be open all night and this year the carnival executive will not be having a separate function for themselves but will be in attendance at the centre. Athletics will be held at the Perry Lakes athletics track. This is still the best athletics venue in Perth. Perry Lakes will also be home for mens Basketball. All games will be held at the Perry Lakes basketball stadium.

Close to the grounds in the middle of Mount Lawley is the Alexander Park Bowling club. This club has seen many top games of lawn bowls and the carnival teams this year will be playing some top games at this yenue.





The Jewish National Fund is the sole Land Reclamation and Afforestation Authority of the State of Israel, and the "greening of Israel" has been one of the prime goals of the Jewish National Fund since its establishment at the turn of the century.

The results of 80 years of reforestation are impressive. Proud forests now stand where once there was bare rock and sand. The coolness of a pine grove shelters hikers from the blazing sun. Israel is becoming a wooded land once agin. So dramatic has been the change, that the expression "The Green Line" has crept into the vocabulary. As one flies into Israel from the East, the desert is suddenly bisected by the greenness marking the border. This is "The Green Line". In total over 160 million trees have been planted by the J.N.F. since its creation.

In addition to planting trees, the J.N.F. invests substantial resources and energy in irrigating, cutting, pruning and thinning out its veteran forests. Each year, forest maintenance is provided for some 2.5 million trees. The national afforestation master plan projects the addition of 125,000 acres of J.N.F. forests by the year 200. This will bring the total afforested area from 266,000 acres to nearly 400,000 acres, and will involve the planting of 5 million trees each year.

J.N.F. forests protect the land and preserve its natural beauty. In recent years they have also served another function: increasing numbers of Israelis use them as venues for rest and relaxation. To date some 300 playgrounds, picnic areas and campsites have been established, as well as 20 active recreation areas — each equipped with physical fitness facilities.

ZIONIST MOVEMENT AND MACCABI WANT **CLOSER TIES**

Talks took place in Melbourne last week between representatives of the Zionist Federation of Australia and the Australian Maccabi Federation, aimed at developing closer links between the two Federal bodies.

The meeting, which examined the feasibility of the organisations establishing joint educational and cultural projects and other co-operative undertakings, was scheduled to coincide with the visit to Melbourne of Maccabi World Union Representative, Ze'ev Anolik, who is currently touring Australia.

A communal reception for Mr Anolik, who is the Director of the English Speaking and European Department of World Maccabi, was held last Tuesday under the joint auspices of the State Zionist Council of Victoria, the Zionist Federation of Australia, and the Australian Maccabi Movement.

Apart from conferring with local communal groups, Mr Anolik is here to promote next year's 12th International Maccabiah beginning in Israel in mid-July. He is also to be the guest of the Australian Maccabi Federation during the 52nd National Maccabi Sports Carnival which gets underway in Perth later this month.

ZIONIST FEDERATION **CONGRATULATES PRIME MINISTER**

The President of the Zionist Federation of Australia, Mr Mark Leibler, has written to Prime Minister Bob Hawke, offering his congratulations following the re-election of the Labor Government.

In his letter, Mr Leibler observed that the continuity of the Prime Minister's personal support and commitment to Israel was keenly felt and greatly appreciated by all those associated with the Zionist Movement in this country who saw it as a true measure and reflection of Mr Hawke's compassion and integrity.

However, he also noted that in relation to matters of policy, differences of approach had occasionally arisen in the past between the Government and the Federation.

Concluding on an optimistic note, Mr Leibler went on to state that: "I remain confident that any Government over which you preside will maintain as a priority the safeguarding and survival of the Jewish State, while continuing to use its good offices to bring about a just and lasting peace to all the Nations and Peoples of the Middle East."

SERMONETTE ON HANUKAH

The Festival of Chanukah is one which is exciting for young and old alike. As we all look upon the Menorah and the candles burning we see many images, not least the historic memories of our people throughout time. Today the Menora and the candles shine forth as a glorious message to inspire our people Israel with the courage of the Maccabees, and the importance of cleansing our hearts as we cleansed the Temple, and to work for Kiddush Hashem, for the State of Israel, and for our own communal life, with the same vigour of sincerity and devotion as the Maccabees of old. Above all we must understand that our Festival has no connection with the Seasonal festivities of our neighbours of the other faiths. It is in fact purely coincidental that the 25th day of Kisley is often misinterpreted because of the 25th day of December. Our calendars are different and the source of history of Chanukah antidates the origin of the Season for our neighbours. 

FROM THE RABBI

There are times when I think that I must be a singularly perverse individual. I have this silly habit of looking for meaning and value where there is apparently none to be found. My latest foray into the realms of futility was inspired by the Point Peron women's camp.

I have no intention of addressing the issues of peace and disarmament at the moment, even though they were the ostensible grounds for the camp's existence. They are simply too important to be given the cavalier treatment that a column of this size would demand. I am rather more intrigued by the fact that this was a "women's" camp — a place where men clearly were not welcome.

Judiasm in the Twentieth Century has had to confront the issue of sexism, just like the rest of society, and to a greater or lesser degree adjustments have been forthcoming. That our tradition recognized differences between men and women is not at issue. That this recognition became entrenched in a way that disadvantaged women and advantaged men is at issue.

When revolutionaries overthrow one dictatorship, only to replace it with another dictatorship, you have to ask if they are any better off. Similarly, if the answer to male domination of society is seen as the introduction of female domination, then is the society that is being produced a better one? Or is it just a variation on the same theme?

Progressive Judaism recognizes that our tradition is in part a production of those same forces that shape the society at large. That does not mean that every "trendy" issue must be incorporated into Judaism. But it does mean that we must evaluate and confront those things that have moulded us in the past and which challenge us today.

We are challenged today by the question: If men and women are different, does that mean that one must be dominant? I believe that the answer must be "no". Being "antimale" is as bad as being "anti-female". What we must be, as Jews and human beings, is "pro-people". And anyone who discriminates against people on the basis of gender is doing a grave disservice to we b'nei adam. Rabbi Ian D. Morris

In the inter-district game, Doovie Cohen came to the rescue to Mt Lawley with a valuable 22 not out to guide the team to its first win in the Invererity Shield.


BRIDGE NOTES

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



GENOCIDE

Readers will have seen the publicity, by Group II, on this film. Group II puts so much work, and that so excellently, into everything they do, that this column hesitates even in supporting their publicity lest it detracts from it!

However, we do urge, most strongly, the Community's support. Go to see the film, and, perhaps even more importantly, persuade those outside the Community to see it. After Israel's early success, there was a time when it was actually fashionable to be Jewish! It was, notwithstanding, obvious to most of us that the vast number of petrodollars poured into anti-Israel, anti-Zionist, and hence anti-Semitic indoctrination would mean that, in time, the propaganda war would turn against us; the world-wide resurgence of anti-Semitism justifies our omination.

We ourselves are so cognisant of the Holocaust that we tend to forget, or perhaps even not to realise, the disinterest, or often complete lack of knowledge, about it shown by otherwise educated and informed non-Jews.

This, possibly, is one of our few remaining opportunities to bring home to our non-Jewish friends (and there are many) that THE HOLOCAUST REALLY DID TAKE PLACE.

General Tamir Draws Full House

The Perth Jewish Community showed up in remarkable numbers to listen to General Yomtov Tamir, on Wednesday night the 14th November at the Jewish Centre, and Mrs Gild, the President of JNF in Perth welcomed them all with great pleasure.

General Tamir is Chief of Staff of the I.D.F. Northern Command which includes Southern Lebannon, and as such he is a recognised expert on security on both sides of the border. He is also faced with the problems which will result in the event of an Israel withdrawal from Lebanon.

General Tamir, together with Mrs Tamir, were invited by the JNF of Australia & New Zealand to break their journey home to Israel in Perth and give this community the benefit of the General's intimate knowledge of the situation in Southern Lebanon.

General Tamir outlined the various scenaria that may develop in the event of a withdrawal and also the situation in the Middle East with respect to the strengthening of the Syrian armed forces, the Iraq-Iran War and the security of the Galil considering the unfavourable demographic balance between Jews and Arabs in this critical area.

The General then turned to the subject of Mitzpim as a means of controlling Arab land encroachment and incidentally developing

the vacant and strategic hilltops of the Galil. This not only populates the Galil, but incidentally gives many hundreds of families a better alternative life style in a beautiful part of the country away from the pollution and overcrowding of Tel-Aviv and Haifa.

General Tamir went into some detail on the Galil Australia section of the redevelopment, illustrated by slides and expressed gratitude for the work of the JNF in providing an infrastructure for this vital area.

After some questions and answers, Prof. Max Walters moved a vote of thanks to General Tamir and assured him of the community's unswerving support for Israel.

The meeting ended around 9.30 p.m. and some of the crowd stayed on to talk to General Tamir at a personal level.

Brig-General Tamir's Visit To Carmel School

Brig-General Tamir addressed years 10-11—the 15 and 16 year-olds at the Carmel High School. He spoke about the complicated situation in Lebanon the need to protect the Northern Border and to develop the Galilee. The girls and boys asked very pertinent questions, demonstrating a good understanding of current affairs.

The General was gratified with their attention and attitude, saying they were the best group of school students he had addressed.

The JNF thanks Mr Ramsay for his ever courteous co-operation in permitting important persons to speak to his students.

FEAR SHOW TRIALS OF JEWS

Arrests, Searches Go On; Hunger Strike in Moscow

NEW YORK — In recent days, two more unofficial Jewish teachers in the Ukraine have been arrested, the homes of others in Moldavia searched, and rumours have spread of public show trials in Moscow and Odessa.

In addition, the Student Struggle for Soviety Jewry and Chicago Action for Soviety Jewry reported, 42 Moscow Jews who began a sympathy hunger strike have declared that they are "witness to prove" that none of those arrested in the latest KGB crackdown are guilty or want other than to emigrate to Israel.

According to the SSSJ and CASJ, 10 policemen leapt from cars on Oct. 16, twisted the arms of unofficial Jewish teacher Yakov Mesh of Odessa, then beat him before dragging him away from his job in a local theatre. He was accused of refusing to testify against fellow teacher Yakov Levin, jailed in August, and with resisting arrest. Although eight coworkers signed a statement that Mesh put up no fight, he was seen at the police station limping and with a black eye. The local prosecutor's office denied he had been beaten. Mesh's wife Marina wrote to the Prosecutor-General of the USSR demanding that her husband be hospitalized and the perpetrators of the attack be punished.

Levin was arrested a week before his slated wedding to fellow unofficial jewish teacher Judith Nepomnischy, also of Odessa. Her 53 year-old father Mark was arrested on October 12 in Moscow, then transferred to Odessa. He is accused of "anti-Soviet slander".

The homes of activists Aron Munblit of Kishinev and Polina Green of Tiraspoal were raided by police. They were told it was in connection with the case of Levin, also charged with "anti-Soviet slander," the SSSJ and CASJ said.

Rumours, evidently begun by the authorities, have spread in Odessa that "a Zionist group with connections to the West," and which has harmed the USSR, has been uncovered. The expected trial might be broadcast on Ukrainian or national television.

Another unconfirmed story spreading in Moscow is that unofficial Jewish teachers Alexander Kholmysansky and Yuli Edelstein, arrested in July and September, respectively, will be put in the dock together in a show trial. Kholmyansky is charged with harbouring a gun and bullets, and Edelstein with possessing drugs.

Kholmyansky has been on a protest fast in prison since Septemebr 14. According to the SSSJ and CASJ, on October 20 as the Sabbath ended, 42 Moscow Jews began a sympathy hunger strike. In an open letter to the Central Committee of the Communist Party, the Prosecutor-General, and the Minister of Internal Affairs, the group declared that "Soviet authorities have developed a campaign of moral and physical annihilation against Jewish refuseniks who seek to repatriate to Israel.

"Kholmyansky, Edelstein, Levin, Mesh and Nepomnischy have been arrested. We are acting as witness to explain and prove that none of them perpetuated the "crimes" for which they are being incriminated and have never had any other aim than going to Israel.

"We demand:"

- 1 "That the pistol, bullets and copies of prohibited books planted during the search of Kholmyansky's apartment be removed as evidence.
- 2 "That the illegal detentions of Kholmyansky and Edelstein cease.
- 3 "That Yakov Mesh be released and criminal proceedings be instituted against those people who are guilty of extermination.
- 4 "The immediate intervention of the Prosecutor-General in the criminal cases against Yakov Levin and Mark Nepomnishy."

A REMINDER TO WAR CRIMINALS

NEW YORK — The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith said the announcement by the Justice Department of the return to Germany of an accused Nazi war criminal who had lived in the USA for many years, "stands as a reminder that war criminals, whether past, present or future, will not go unpunished."

Seymour Reich, chairman of ADL's national Civil Rights Committee, commended the Justice Department for "vigorously pursuing" its investigation against Arthur L.H. Rudolph, A German-born U.S. citizen. Rudolph, in accordance with an agreement he signed with the Department, relinquished his citizenship in May, 1984, and has permanently departed the United States.

Zachar Zunshain was sentenced at the Lenin District Court of Riga on June 28 1984 to a three year period of imprisonment. He is a 33 year old Jewish maths and physics teacher in Riga Latvia SSR.

In 1981 he and his wife, Tatiana, applied for permission to emigrate to Israel. They have received continuous refusals without explanation. As a result Zunshain tried to appeal to high ranking authorities and entered into correspondence with the Ministry of Interior, the Procurator's office, the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet of the USSR and others, regarding the decision that had been made. He maintains that he has only done this for the realization of his legal rights to leave the USSR.

The appeals and complaints were considered by the procurator's office of the Latvian SSR to be slanderous fabrications.

Zachar was arrested on 5th March 1984 following a peaceful demonstration he and his wife staged with two other Riga refuseniks in Revolution Square Moscow, holding a placard asking that their Soviet citizenship be withdrawn.

On the 28th June, Zachar Zunshein was finally brought to trial, despite the fact there appears to be absolutely no evidence whatsoever to convict him. The material shown to him, was only the letters he wrote to the various Soviet Authorities.

Zunshain was given the maximum sentence of three years in a labour camp, and his reaction when the sentence was handed down was to sing the hatikvah.

IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT OUR ATTENTION TO THE CASE OF ZACHAR ZUNSHAIN IS MAINTAINED, AS IT REPRESENTS A THREAT TO ALL JEWS WHO SEEK TO EMIGRATE FROM THE SOVIET UNION, BECAUSE IT IS THE FIRST TIME THAT THE SOVIET AUTHORITIES HAVE PUNISHED A MAN WHOSE ONLY CRIME IS THAT HE SENT AN OFFICIAL DECLARATION REGARDING HIS DESIRE TO LEAVE THE COUNTRY.

The next luncheon Get Together of Wizo Galil will be held at the Jewish Centre on Monday, November 26 at 11.00 a.m.






