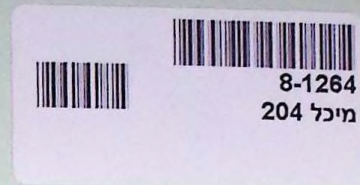

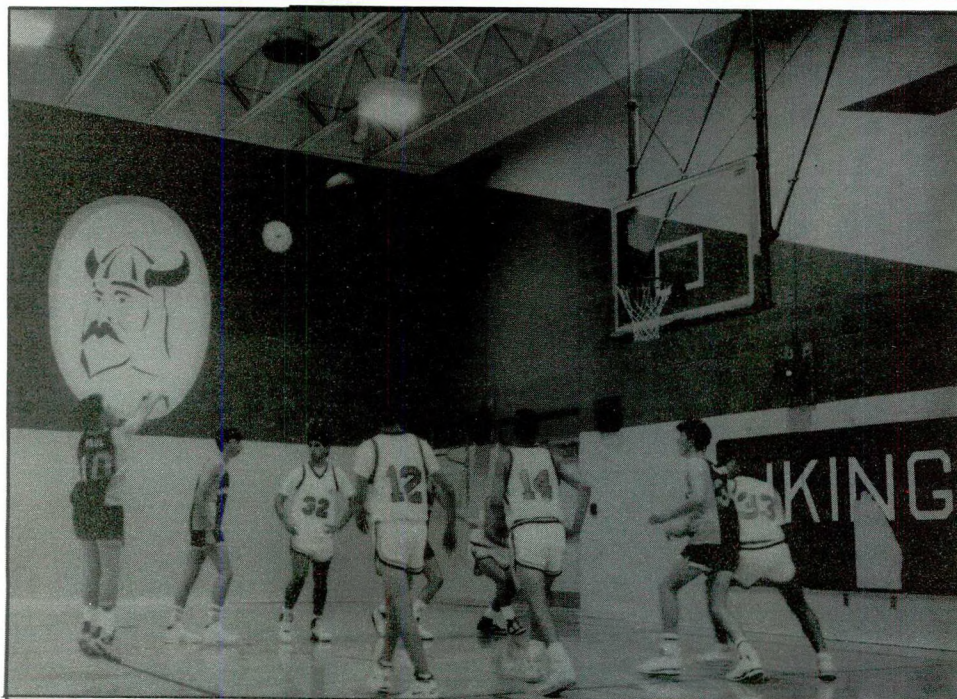

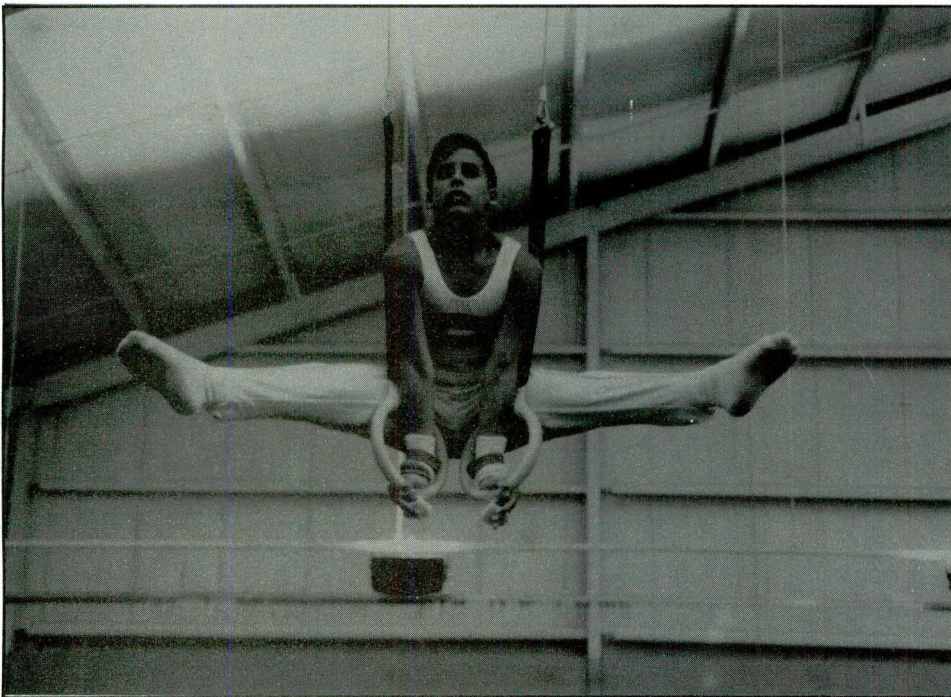

Medical Team at the Ready

Funded by Sinai Hospital, the J.C.C. Maccabi games medical team, headed by Dr. Michael Kobernick is on hand daily at the Jewish Center to treat injuries. The group includes a physician, a nurse, and an emergency department technician.

The medical staff is here to treat on-field injuries, falls, spasms, and bruises, Dr. Kobernick explained. The staff will evaluate each injury as it occurs and provide first aid. The staff must then make the decision whether to send the athlete back to the game, to pull them from

the match, or to call 911.

Dr. Solomon Hackbaum, Chief of Emergency at Sinai Hospital, arranged for the staffing. Dr. Kobernick reports that the team has already treated a broken arm, a broken leg, and serious abdominal injuries.

Bus Anyone?

How would you transport 2,200 participants and 500 coaches to and from the Jewish Community Center to eleven venue sites and back during five days of competition?

That was the problem facing Transportation co-Chairmen Mark Saidman and Jerry Eisenshtadt. The two arranged for 50 busses and drivers from the United Hebrew Schools and Walled Lake Schools fleets, as well as the extensive scheduling of shuttles. In addition, maintenance personnel remain on the J.C.C. lot in case there is a breakdown.

According to Saidman, "Everything is running well. We haven't lost a kid yet."

Games Open in Grand Style

Spectacular Opening Ceremony Draws 12,000 to the Palace

No one had really understood it. Not the athletes or their coaches, not the host families or the volunteers, not even the organizers of the whole event, who seemed to have come to grips with the number 2,000 and all of its huge implications. No, no one had genuinely understood how awesome that number really is when it is counted in living souls, one by one, uniform by uniform, smile by beaming smile, Jew by fellow Jew, until last night. And as the delegations flowed

from the tunnel in a seemingly never-ending river of color and light, all 12,000 of those who were present watching began to suddenly realize how massive and sensational the undertaking in which they were taking part really was. And they cheered.

To be sure, the emotion of the moment was not lost on the athletes as they emerged from the Palace's narrow tunnel into the furor of the arena. They were on

a natural high from which they refused to come down, even after David Hermelin, Master of Ceremonies and part owner of the Palace, began his thanking of the sponsors. The mad rush after the speeches to dance to Gemini's music was thus a welcome release.

While every delegation, and in particular Detroit, received its due applause in spades, the tiny, 15-member team from Lithuania absolutely brought the house down. The standing ovation they were given seemed to be general acknowledgement of the miracle of their being there, of the emotional return of an isolated Jewish community to the patchwork quilt of world Jewery.

The evening's only tense moments occurred when the torch, despite best efforts, refused to light. But as it hissed and snorted and finally coughed into life, David Hermelin announced the 1990 Jewish Community Centers North American Maccabi Youth Games to be officially open.

"I've never seen the Olympics before," said spectator Stan Berlin, shaking his head, "but it must be just as thrilling."

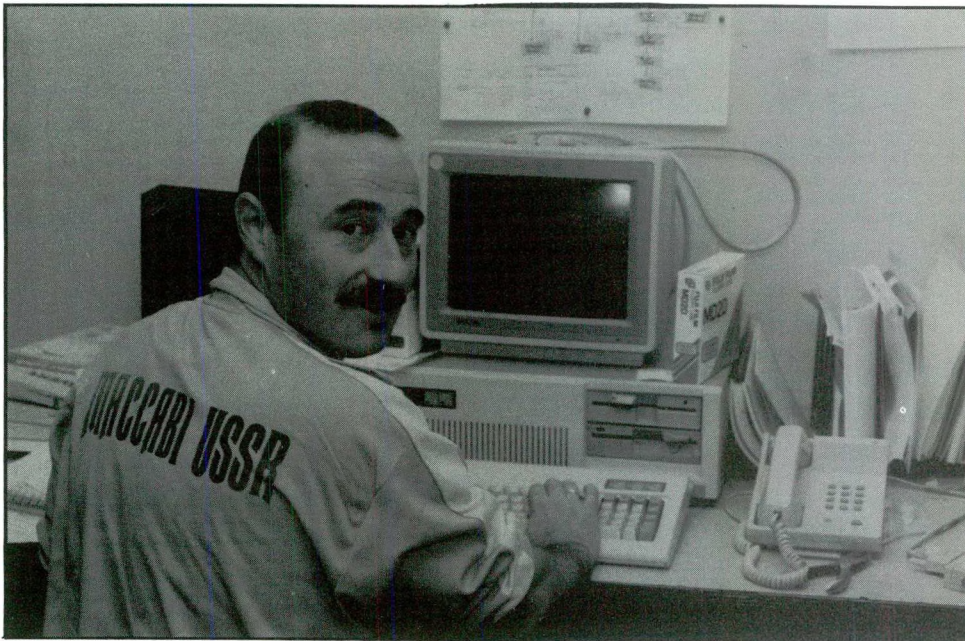

Excitement Builds; Detroit Ready on Eve of the Games

Another pink slip of paper is added to the growing pile in front of Games Coordinator Beth Robinson as she sits, telephone in hand, behind her cluttered desk in the Youth Games office. Each scrap of paper in the pile is a phone message from one of the thousands of athletes, coaches, delegation heads, host families, volunteers, or sponsors participating in the 1990 Jewish Community Centers North American Maccabi Youth Games.

What had been but a few months

ago a quiet office tucked away deep in the basement of the West Bloomfield Jewish Community Center, staffed by a small group of employ-

ees and detached from the Center's diurnal activities, is now a pandemonium of ringing

telephones, whirring computers, clattering copy machines, and bustling volunteers. The Games are at hand, and excitement is at a feverish pitch.

And why not? With over 2000 Jewish athletes arriving in Detroit this week from points as close as Toledo and as distant as the Soviet Union, and with over 1000 local Jewish families opening their homes to the incoming teams, and with a veritable smorgasbord of sports and cultural events planned, undoubtably crowned tonight by the spectacular opening ceremonies at the Palace of Auburn Hills, it may be hard to find anyone who isn't just a little giddy with anticipation.

These J.C.C. Maccabi games promise to be one of the biggest in the event's eight year history, with a total of 56 delegations competing in 15 sports, three of which (chess, cross-country, and golf) are new for this year. There is a staggering 43 basketball teams, 25 soccer teams, and 250 tennis players vying for the gold medal.

Making the whole event come together will be the army of volunteers, who will perform such tasks as coordinating the movement of the 65 bus flotilla, timing and scoring every match of every event, and serving some 10,000 lunches to athletes throughout the week.
