From the President

In reflecting on the events and achievements of 1995 there is much that has happened during the year for us to be very proud.

It was also a year which brought profound sadness to the organisation and the community as a whole when Prime Minister Yitzak Rabin was assinated in November, 1995. For those who attended the Maccabiah Games in Israel in 1993 who will ever forget the moving, closing ceremony and the message delivered by the late Prime Minister to those who were present in Jerusalem 'the Maccabiah is a unique phenomena - a phenomena of Jewish solidarity, sport, commitment to the faith of the Jewish people and devotion to Israel'.

The Maccabi movement was regarded as a most important link by the late Prime Minister between Israel and the Diasproa and in his words we must 'carry the message' of the continuity of Jewish history in the city of Jerusalem.

Victoria Maccabi continues to play a critical role in the vital area of maintenance of Jewish continuity and awareness through our sporting, cultural and social activities. Many of our 2,500 active members throughout 28 affiliated clubs, rely very much, in some cases solely, on Maccabi for their contact and connections within our community.

1995 has seen further gains being made in consolidating Maccabi as a significant organisation within the community and playing a most important role in the area of communal affairs.

1995 Highlights

Junior Carnival

The 13th Junior Maccabi Carnival saw a team of over 250 travel to Sydney under the hard working and able leadership of Abe Berman backed by a team of very committed assistants. The Carnival was an outstanding success.

Victoria Maccabi's commitment to Junior Carnival and its present format is reflected by the decision by the executives to host the 14th Junior Carnival in Melbourne in January, 1996. By the time this yearbook goes to print, the Carnival will be in full swing and the 700 participants will be indulging in traditional Melbourne hospitality.

Senior Carnival

Approximately 130 competitors attending the 62nd Carnival in Perth under the excellent leadership of Sam Parasol and his assistants, Lisa Borowick and Julian, Isaacs, Tony Aarons and David Parasol.

Auction Night

The annual Maccabi Auction Night at Leonda has become a most popular evening with our members and, once again, was an outstanding financial and social success this year. The attractiveness of the venue is a major factor in the success of the event and we are very grateful for the support we continue to receive from the Spotless Group in making Leonda available and from Peter Unger, whose support for Maccabi is outstanding. Fanny Abrahami, once again, put in a huge effort to make the evening a success and she led a very competent and committed team of workers. In 1996, we will be looking for an alternative format to continue to make the evening as popular and attractive as ever.

Jewish Community Planning and Development Board, being a key recommendation in the report of the Commission for the Future. - In junior football, the Ajax under 15 team had anothergreat year and won back to back premierships. The team was guided through the year by Glen Coleman and we look forward to many members of the team continuing their commitment through into the senior ranks.
- The Maccabi table tennis team fielded an A grade pennant team for the first time ever.
- The spectacular growth which has been achieved by the basketball club in previous years continued and the basketball club has now probably the largest membership of any of the affiliated clubs.
- The Ajax senior football club finalised plans to return to Albert Park in 1996 with completion of the leasing arrangements for the oval and new pavilion which will provide a magnificent venue for the Club and Maccabi in the years ahead.

Community Centre Sub-Committee

Probably the most active sub-committee during the year was the Community Centre Sub-Committee which has been assessing the needs of the organisation and the affiliated clubs. The sub-committee investigated a number of different proposals which came forward during the year. For various reasons, none of the proposals considered have been acceptable. There is a great challenge for the subcommittee to make further progress in planning towards providing a long term home for the in the success and welfare of the organisation.

Finally, I wish to record my deep appreciation to our Executive Director, Paul Bronstein and his office staff who has worked tirelessly for the organisation and, once again, is responsible for producing this outstanding yearbook. The continued support of our major sponsors, donors and advertisers in making the yearbook possible is also gratefully acknowledged.

Senior Carnival

Sam Parasol led the team to Western Australia last year as he will to the Gold Coast 1995/96. Sam, ably assisted by Lisa Borowick, has involved Tony Aarons, Julian Isaacs and David Parasol as assistant team managers. All three have come through our Youth Leadership Program and I expect them to become involved at board level in the future.

Junior Carnival

Abe Berman did a great job as team manager, taking a team of 350 to Sydney in early 1995 where all present had a wonderful social and sporting holiday. In 1996 Michael Sput has been appointed team manager and has enrolled several new faces at team management level. Alan Silver heads the Carnival Organising Committee and has also surrounded himself with many new faces.

Fundraising

Victoria Maccabi, as a roof body, continually strives to develop new fundraising initiatives and provide new vehicles to assist clubs in their fundraising objects. The purpose of fundraising is twofold; to raise funds to support our affiliated clubs, and to keep the Maccabi Office running. The Auction Cabaret, Footy Tipping Competition and Melbourne Cup Raffle were the main vehicles for 1995 and for those who were involved I would like to thank them for their support.

The Footy Tipping Competition

This year proved very exciting with five people alive coming to the finals series and two, Allen Brostek and Louis Cukierman surviving to the Grand final. REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF YOUTH AND SPORTS OF THE JEWISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL OF VICTORIA

In my role of Youth and Sports Chairman on the JCCV Executive, I have had meetings with many different groups during the year including the Hillel Foundation of Victoria, the Zionist Youth Council, the Australasian Union of Jewish Students, and of course Victoria Maccabi. These meetings as well as my attendance at a recent Jewish Community Services inc. conference on the integration of Soviet Youth into our community has highlighted the huge amount of work that is needed for this very important age group.

A big concern for this community is the large number of non-affiliated adults between the ages of 18 and 30 years. This is where Victorian Maccabi can play a very important role in providing a venue for interaction for this group of young Jewish adults, and perhaps prevent them from being lost to the community.

Again as part of my work as a member of the sub committee where we evaluated The Commission For The Future Report in the area of community services, the urgent need for a home for young adults was again highlighted.

During the year I represented Victoria Maccabi inc. at many communal functions including the UJEB centenary celebration dinner, as well as the Inaugural meeting of HAYOM (Helping Adolescent Youth Outreach Movement). I also represent Victoria Maccabi at the JCCV monthly plenum. I was instrumental in organising a Tree Planting Ceremony in Princess Park together with the JNF, which included. Jewish day schools and the Ajax Junior Football Club. The ceremony was in honour of the memory of the RT. HON. Arthur Augustus Calwell, K.C.S.G. (first federal minister of immigration 1945-1949), whose humanitarian policy opened Australia's shores to victims of the Holocaust at the end of the war.

I was also involved in the organisation of the Summer Agenda program at Caulfield Hebrew Congregation, a program introduced to attract young men and women to a traditional synagogue service providing spiritual and social interaction. The groups participating in this summer agenda included: AUJS, Victoria Maccabi, Young UIA and Hillel. Victoria Maccabi are also involved in the Communal Planning and Development Board (C.P.D.B.)

The youth are our future and the future leaders of this community and therefore it should be one of our highest priorities to encourage and involve them as well as catering for their needs.





MACCABI JUNIOR SOCCER CLUB

1995 has been a very successful year for the Club. It was our second year at Caulfield Park and has been a year of consolidation. At the commencement of the year powerful new lights were installed which have provided excellent training facilities. Also during the year a part of the change room was converted into a kiosk. 



Joe Silver has returned to coach the club in an honorary position, something everyone at the Club is extremely grateful to Joe for.





In the words of a famous president, I quote, "Ask not what your club can do for you, but what you can do for your club".

I commence by report in this manner, as the issue of parental involvement is of immense importance in the running of any successful club. The success of our club should not just be measured by the number of children playing, games won on the field, nor on individual milestones, but on the amount of assistance, co-operation and support behind the scenes from parents as well as the committee.

The Ajax Junior Football Club has always been held in high regard by the Jewish and general community, and in order for us to keep growing and implement new programs, we need your support. Those parents who have been involved will tell you what a great feeling it is being part of the overall team. The satisfaction of seeing improvement in the team and individuals throughout the season is exciting and gratifying.

One of these new initiatives implemented this year where support was vital and forthcoming, was the 'merger' of the Vic Kick Clinic on Sunday morning, with our existing clinic. Alan Jankie instigated and co-ordinated this merger, and with Dennis Benjamin and Dennis Seidl coaching the boys, our numbers swelled to over forty. This AFL assisted clinic took the boys week by week through the various skills required to play the game, and we should see the results in ensuing years.

The Ajax Junior Football Club fielded twelve teams in season 1995, in the MSJFL. Four of those sides, under 9 Jets and comets and under 10 Jets and Comets competed in a modified rules competition, where the emphasis is on learning the skills of the game. Eight sides played for premiership points, and in our most successful year, seven teams reached the finals, or an end result of two premierships, one runner up, and four sides losing in the first semi final. This was an outstanding result for the club, and I would like to think that the measures implemented this year by our match committee lead by Reuben Benkel had some impact on this result. Under 10 Jets and Comets, coached by Warwick Butt and Peter Thurin were both very competitive and enthusiastic.

Dennis Seidl's under 11 Jets started brilliantly, winning their first few games, but unfortunately, due to injuries and a shortage of numbers, could not sustain this effort throughout the season. Sam Chester finished 10th in the MSJFL. awards.

The under 11 Comets, coached by Simon Raleigh fulfilled the promise shown in 1994, by reaching this years finals series. Simon's rotation of all players throughout the season ensured all the boys carried equal responsibility, and to see the boys determination, desperation, and mature teamwork is a credit to all concerned. Jarrod Raleigh finished 6th in the MSJFL awards.

The under 12 Jets were coached this year by club stalwart, Mark Zuker. Mark's extensive experience in recruiting players, and moulding a team into a strong unit brought immediate results, with the boys finishing equal top on the ladder. The team won the second semi by four points, and eventually were beaten in the grand final, against a taller, stronger opposition, but their effort to almost clinch the game after being four goals down in the last quarter was sensational. Well done boys.

Noah Tyler and Oded Henzel both played well in the league best and fairest.

The under 12 Comets proved very competitive throughout the season, eventually losing the first semi. They were coached by Alex Hampel and Ari Lewski, had another great season, finishing 2nd in the MSJFL awards.

Reuben Benkel's under 13's Jets played in the highest division of their competition, and despite being younger and playing against bigger and stronger teams, the boys played exceptional team football, losing the first semi to the eventual premiers.





The under 15 team, coached by Glen Coleman again showed its class by winning back to back





AJAX AMATEUR FOOTBALL CLUB

After 25 years at Albert Park, AJAX Football Club was forced to move due to the redevelopment of the Park prior to the Grand Prix in 1996. The Club was re located to Fawkner Park, a beautiful step up and the early results indicated that the Club would have a successful year in the C Grade of the VAFA.

The Maccabi Health and Fitness Club is one of the oldest clubs under the Maccabi umbrella. The AJAX Gym Club was formed and founded in 1924 to cater for Carlton's Jewish teenage

We are still seeking new members and all newcomers will receive a warm welcome.







VICTORIA MACCABI INDOOR SPORTS CLUB ESTABLISHED 1995

The idea of an indoor sports club was hatched at the last carnival in Perth over the summer of 1994/95. With Victorian teams in mixed netball, beach volleyball, indoor soccer and indoor cricket all performing admirably, with many victories and the sports becoming more and more popular at each carnival, establishing a home base in Melbourne for these sports became a priority. Adding mixed basketball took us up to five different sports on offer and a club was born.

Across Australia, indoor sports have been growing at a rapid rate and the number of participants amongst the Jewish Community is no exception. Our first priority was to find a home. As many of us were already playing at Action Cricket Moorabbin, where we knew the management and staff who had previously provided uniforms and equipment to our indoor cricket team, it became a logical choice for a home base. The new facilities, at 100 Cochranes Road Moorabbin, include 4 indoor courts plus a beach volleyball court and a bar.

The next step was to find enthusiastic and committed members to establish a committee. Many of these people have become involved in running a club for the first time and have shown to be adept and committed not only to this club, but to the Maccabi ideals instilled in all of us involved in the organisation.

In the space of five months, the club has already won two premierships and been runners up on three further occasions. In the first three months we established seven teams in indoor cricket, beach volleyball, indoor soccer and mixed basketball. At present we are about to start teams in a new season of mixed netball and in a new sport called Slick-Pass, a modified Aussie Rules game. and came back from a twelve point deficit midway into the second of three periods to turn the game around to win 35-28. 

NORTH CAULFIELD MACCABI SOCCER CLUB

For the Maccabi Soccer Club, 1995 could best be summed up as the year of the good, the bad and the ugly.

The use of these cliche' is most accurate, when you consider the senior soccer team managed to finish second in the Victorian Soccer Federation - provisional League Sth East Central 3rd Division in a most difficult year.

Another issue which continued to plague the club was the issue of playing Saturdays or Sundays.

In regards to this issue, the club made a point at the start of the season that it was going to respect the Shabbath and all Jewish Holidays no matter what the consequences were going to be.

Whilst the club was able to pursued the Victorian Soccer Federation of its religious argument for placing on Sundays only during the season, the club ran into the Federation head on when it came to playing the end of season play-offs for promotion at the end of the season which was scheduled for Saturdays only.

Unfortunately, Maccabi was forced to withdraw from the play-offs over the playing day issue after doing its utmost to get the Federation to change its intransigent policy and therefore forfeited its right to try and gain a promotion place to the second division in 1996.

This left many players and officials of the club very demoralised after having fought off three teams for the second spot in its League.

The playing day issue continues to be one major issue that the Victorian Soccer Federation and Maccabi have been at loggerheads over for many years and with neither side moving from its stated positions it is an issue that will continue to be argued in 1996.

Gary Bailison also had a magnificent season and managed to make the right full-back position his own in 1995.

Whilst a number of players performed excellently in 1995, it was still difficult to maintain player depth, especially in training and to focus players on improving their skills and fitness levels to a higher standard.




The club is confident of continuing to grow and improve in future years backed by an unprecedented commitment to junior development and is continually striving to improve its community and player support.

1-0 victory over Wantirna UTD who were undefeated all season until losing in both reserves and seniors to a spirited Maccabi side.









AJAX SWIMMING CLUB

In the 1994-95 season AJAX Swimming Club officially changed its name to AJAX Maccabi Swimming Club to coincide with the State, National and World Organisations. The year has been a successful, the second in a five year plan that the Swimming Club hopes will develop and produce quality Jewish swimmers at Club, District, State and possibly National levels.

The highlight of the year was the very successful Victorian Jewish Swimming Championships held at the State Swimming Centre last April. Over 190 competitors, including swimmers from NSW, took part in the yearly event which caters for swimmers 6 years to Open including Mothers, Fathers and Family races.

There were a number of bright new stars that took a step forward at the championships. Jarrod Kagan, Melissa Fein, Joshua Grokop, Dora Banyasz and Brent Lukav all dominated their age-groups and look ready to continue to improve their times as the year progresses. Next year's Championships will be held on March 31, 1996 at the State Swimming Centre. The club is anticipating over 200 competitors at what will be the biggest gathering of Australian Jewish Swimmers in a long time.

The Swim Club took a team of five swimmers and two adults to Sydney for the New South Wales Jewish Championships in May 1995. This was the first Victorian Jewish swimming team to travel to these championships in 10 years. All of the Victorian swimmers swam close to or better than their personal best (PB) times, however, Melissa Fein's win in the Girls 14 years 50m Backstroke stood out as the highlight of the meet. She smashed an 11 year old record by over a second. The team that consisted of Mark Roach, Tim Krivitsky, Jarrod Kagan, Melissa Fein and Lisa Paneth were all in the top four placegetters in their events. Most importantly everybody had a great time in and out of the pool and the young Victorian and New South Wales swimmers started a relationships that will hopefully last a long time. Back for more next year! You can bet on it.

The Swimming club took part in the annual Spring Pennant Interclub competition in October and November. Over 30 juniors between the ages of 8 and 12 joined forces to compete against other Victorian swim clubs in an all relay round-robin event. AJAX fielded three Junior teams (B-Grade, E-Grade and G-Grade) and one Senior team (C-Grade) and although none of the teams won a premiership as they did 2 years ago, the spirit and determination shown by everybody was encouraging.

The club also held two Open Carnivals during the year. These carnivals catered to all ages, across all strokes and distances ranging from 25m to 200m. These meets still continue to be a source of race practice and time trials for those swimmers who only get a chance to be in the water during training and lessons.

AJAX started a morning training squad at Caulfield Grammar School in August and despite the interest generated initially, training had to halted at the start of November due to lack of attendance. It appears that parents would like their children to participate in an AJAX Swim Club run training squad. Under coach and Maccabiah 1500m Bronze medallist Andrew Maver the club is now searching for an afternoon training alternative due to commence in early 1996.

Jarrod Kagan was the AJAX swimmer of the year. Jarrod came through eliminations and semi-finals to finish sixth in the Boys 11 years 50m Butterfly at the All Junior competition. He just missed the final and came ninth in the State Sprint Championships in the same event and finished 12th in the Boys 11 yrs 100m Butterfly in his first Victorian Swimming Championships. Hopefully, Jarrod can go on to bigger and better things in the coming year.

Melissa Fein was the sole AJAX Swimming Club representatives selected in the Maccabiah Games training squad. Melissa is training up to five times per week at the moment in her quest for final Maccabiah squad selection in the 1996/97 season. A preliminary squad was announced mid-year to assist potential qualifying swimmers in setting long and short term goals. The squad will be seeking to raise funds for training camps and the final trip to Israel in 1997.

The Club held successful fund raisers during the year. The movie Apollo 13 with Tom Hanks was the most popular event with the Cadbury's chocolate driver not far behind. As at the date of writing a Bingo Night is to be held soon in what we hope will provide the club with the ever necessary funds.

On a sadder note, AJAX Swimming Club ended a five year association with Joan Campbell's "Swimming With Care" Learn To Swim School. It was a decision between the two parties, which





1995 has seen the establishment of the Victorian Maccabi Ten Pin Bowling club as the Number One Jewish Ten Pin Club in the Country with some awesome displays of bowling at the various tournaments held Australia wide throughout the year.

Commencing at the Senior Carnival in Perth at the beginning of the year, the squad of six bowlers led by Rick Begleiter, demoralised the opposition with form normally associated with the professional Bowlers. Such much so, the team was fortunate enough to share the outstanding Male Team trophy for the Carnival with the New South Lawn Bowls Team. Not to be outdone by his team mates, Barry Wicks also collected the Outstanding Male Competitor at the Senior Carnival, performing an extraordinary high level over the six days of competition. Barry's bowling was at times awesome as he mastered the conditions of the Lanes and collected medals in every classification of the event, culminating in a devastating win in the all events Masters Final. Victorians Rick Begleiter and Julian Isaacs completed a hat Trick of placings in the same event, establishing form that would see the other States look for answers on how to combat the Victorians through the upcoming year.

In April, the Victorian Open was played for the first time as the first leg of the East Coast Championships.

Competitors from New South Wales and Queensland attended the event, thus ensuring a high level of scoring to qualify for the finals. Daniel Zalcman was the eventual Male winner holding out Barry Wicks over an enthralling three game final. Unfortunately the Women's trophy headed North to New South Wales, won by Evelyn Rose who defeated Judy Bihari in an equally interesting three game final. The large number of bowlers from interstate ensured that the moving of the Open tournament to earlier in the year was the correct move by the Committee paving the way for a true Open tournament for any Jewish bowler able to attend from anywhere in the country. The traditional June long weekend also was held in Melbourne this year. Once again large numbers of interstate guests swelled the individual event both for Men and Women. The Teams event saw the largest number of competitors for many years on the Sunday afternoon. In the Men's final it was a repeat of the final of the Victorian Open eight weeks previously, however Barry Wicks shot the house down in the three game play off finally overcoming Daniel Zalcman in a high scoring shoot out. The Women's final was tight as well with Sydneysiders Elaine Goldberg and Evelyn Rose thrilling the large crowd to the last frame. Elaine finally won through for an exhausting win. The Victorian Men's Mick Goulbourn side retained the trophy won in Sydney last year with a well fought win over the Sydney Team. At the same time they also collected the Tri State challenge trophy over New South Wales and Queensland. The New South Wales Women's Mick Goulbourn side were easy leaders at the half way break,

however the Victorian Women powered home over the last three games, but could not make up the large break. The overall Men's and Women's trophy was also won by New South Wales in the closest result over the past few years. The Ray Stein trophy also headed to Sydney with an emphatic win by the New South Wales Team.

A number of Victorian bowlers headed North for the New South Wales Open. Barry Wicks continued his outstanding year to date, by becoming the first non Sydneysider to claim the trophy in a final head to head round which included three other Victorians. Barry then in September claimed his third Open title of the year by clean sweeping the Queensland Open event thereby establishing himself as the undisputed Number one Male Ten Pin bowler on the Maccabi scene.

Squads were also named for the 1997 Maccabiah games, out of the sixteen males, there were numerous Victorians. These include Barry Wicks, Daniel Zalcman, Rick Begleiter, Julian Isaacs, Efraim Zylbersztajn and Tony Aarons. Unfortunately only six people can make the team, however given the form of some of these bowlers throughout the year to date, the announcement of the side after the Melbourne Carnival may see this side dominated by Victorian members. In the Women's squad Gila Pitt and Aviva Wierzbicki were named in a list dominated by New South Wales.

The upcoming Carnival in Surfers Paradise will see the strongest competition assembled for the Ten Pin Bowling teams event as the bowlers establish their names for Israel in 1997. The Victorian team has been named earlier than normal, in an effort to participate on local tournaments and to gain valuable time training together for what is traditionally a gruelling event. Barry Wicks, Rick Begleiter, Daniel Zalcman, Julian Isaacs, Tony Aarons continue a succession of Carnivals together as a team with Leon Sawicz making his first appearance after a very consistent year in tournaments and league bowling. Due to a lack of nominations, a Women's side was unable to be put together at the time of writing this article, however every endeavour was being made to place a side in the Carnival. The Committee and members of the club wish their representatives the best of luck at the Carnival, and are hoping for a similar success of the previous year.



AJAX VOLLEYBALL CLUB

To say that 1995 was an eventful year for the Ajax Volleyball Cub is somewhat of an understatement. It was a year of departures and arrivals, mergers and acquisitions, a year of controversy and sentimentality and finally and most important of all, a year of results.

The increasing popularity of volleyball in its various forms, indoor, beach, indoor beach, saw a flood of interested players at the start of the season. Ajax settled to five representative teams, two Men's two Women's and a junior team.

Simon Yudelevich transferred from Footscray Renegades to Ajax, and Sydney based Mike Fischl, star of the NSW Gold Medal winning team, decided to make Melbourne his Volleyball home and committed to flying down most weekends to play with Ajax.

The new look Ajax started the year with spectacular results, surprising even the more optimistic of the club brains trust. Ajax won the State League pre-season invitational in Honours Division, with a thrilling 5 set win in the grand final over East Side Hawks. Having beaten some of the top clubs in the state, Ajax was guaranteed a place in State League for the 1995 season. In fact, the result so impressed the Victorian Volleyball League that they put Ajax into Division One.

Ajax's passage through the season proved that the tournament was not a one off. The bonus addition of Yudelevich and Fischl was supplemented by rookies Andrew Rotstein and Paul Rosenberg who made the step up to senior grade, taking responsibility for vacated positions. Mike Fox proved that you don't have to start young to play volleyball well and setter Peter Bleecher showed that you can be over the hill and still climb the mountain. Peter Haskin combed the back court with ferocity and Perry Cohen was jumping like he did at the start of his career, 17 years ago. all rounder Ron Pila missed a month of season but returned to be the star of the final rounds and Gary Sokolov and Stuart Collins were important contributors, providing stability and depth. Ajax finished the season on top of the ladder but suffered a crushing defeat by highly fancied Heidelberg in the first semi final, losing the double chance. Proof of the increasing maturity of the team was evident in their business like approach to recovering their composure and focusing on the premiership. Ajax did not lose a set in either the preliminary or grand final, defeating Heidelberg in the grand final rematch. The Stage League One premiership completed the hat-trick, adding to the minor premiership and pre-season tournament win. The win has put Ajax in line for promotion into the VVL Honours Division which is the highest standard of volleyball played in the state and would see Ajax up against the top 7 teams in Victoria. Russian Ilya Svedlar filled the coaching position at the start of the year but retired due to family commitments. The remainder of the season saw

the coaching role distributed amongst key club members. Club patriarch Norm Eisenberg with the assistance of specialist coach Serge Mezhov managed match preparation and on court coaching while captain Blecher and Simon Yudelevich ran the training sessions. The club plans to appoint a coach for the coming season in the lead up to the 1997 Maccabiah Games.

The year included some personal highlights for outstanding junior Danny Skrabal and Simon Yudelevich. Seventeen year old Skrabal was selected in the state U17 squad and played a number of state league games with the Ajax senior team. Yudelevich was invited to represent Australia at a prestigious International Beach Volleyball tournament in Hong Kong where the team finished fourth.

Ajax was also the only team to field two teams in the Australian Masters tournament held in Melbourne over the Easter break. The 30+ team, made up of club legends Neal "The Chief" Cohen, "Leaping" Len Kipen and the more senior of the men's state league team, performed admirably, finishing fourth overall. The 40+ team, led by Norm Eisenberg included some of the clubs founding members.

As many as five junior players trained with the Victorian U17 development team (Dean Eisenberg, Mark Mandel, Gnady Kleiner, Ben Preiss and Danny Skrabal) with Danny Skrabal being selected for the squad. The promise shown by these players will be realised by the club in the years to come. The team was managed, coached and chauffeured by Norm Eisenberg who also made his comeback this year.

The senior women's team were forced to drop down to State League Division 3 mid-season due to study commitments of club champion Sara Zeev and injury to rising star Jackie Rudzki. The team comprising, Tori Goldberg, Ray Moss, Julie Lang, Simone Rubenstein, Jane Davis, Michelle Miller, Sharon Beaconsfield and Judy Kohn teamed well taking an equal share of wins and losses throughout the season.

The club celebrated its 25th Anniversary at the presentation night on 10th December this year. Financially, the club has performed well largely due to the success of the men's State League team. Inspired by the teams performance new sponsor LOFRA Gas Cookers funded the acquisition of new playing tops for the club and prize money from Championship wins was gleefully banked by club treasurers Julie Lang and Gary Sokolov.

Socially, the volleyball club continues to be roaring success with no less than three volleyball weddings this year. Tournaments have also proven to be a popular social event, providing a mix of intense competition and equally intense partying.


The club is likely to continue to train at Melbourne High School on Monday nights in the new year with new members assured of a warm welcome.








1995 will go down in AJAX Water Polo history as one of the toughest ever.


The State League Three (SL3) team - having lost several players to work commitments, wives and babies - found itself lacking several of the key players that enabled them to achieve SL3 standard.




Both sides are looking forward to the challenges of 1996.


In these days of nostalgia we need to get people together to rekindle the spirit of the "Old" days. We envisage having more get togethers but we need some input and ideas from you out there.


