Once every four years the Maccabi world really comes to life when more people than ever are involved in our activities. The reason for this is the 15th Maccabiah which will be held in Israel this coming July. It is affectionately known as "The Jewish Olympics" and will bring together the largest in-gathering of Jewish sports people from around the world. It is the "Jewel in the Crown" of Maccabi in which over 5000 competitors plus an estimated 25,000 supporters will arrive in Israel to be part of this sporting spectacular.

Over 50 countries have selected their teams comprising of athletes who they consider have reached the highest standards within their individual sports. The Great Britain team has also been selected and they are now all training hard for the forthcoming Maccabiah. In the coming months the GB Maccabiah Organising Committee, which has been working for the past year will really start to operate at "full speed" to ensure that our team of approximately 370 athletes will be the best prepared and equipped to leave these shores. I am sure we all wish them every success.

This year we will once again be sending our summer tours to Israel and in addition to the usual exciting programme that has been planned we will be including in the itinerary (time table permitting) tickets for the opening or closing ceremonies of the Maccabiah.

Last year we responded to the many requests from our clubs to organise a National Summer Camp. Although only 30 youngsters attended the Camp it was enjoyed by all. Plans are already well under way for this year's Summer Camp and we are expecting over 60 members from many of our clubs to attend.

To add to our summer programmes and to ensure that we are providing opportunity for all of our members, we have joined with Camp America and the Jewish Community Centre Association of North America in the placing and recruitment of our members for their summer camp programme. Our members will work as either sport coaches or camp councillors and it will give them the opportunity to use their skills working with the children of the communities of Chicago, Detroit, New Jersey and Pittsburgh. The JCC Association are looking forward to our members giving their camps a valuable Jewish input.

In addition to all I have mentioned above our normal Maccabi programme goes on. Our clubs and leagues continue to provide a wide variety of activities for their members on a weekly basis and I am proud of Maccabi's input to the Jewish community both in sport and informal education. This work could not be carried out without the continued commitment of all the people who volunteer to give Maccabi an immense amount of their time.

I would like to thank my fellow Honorary Officers for their continued support and a special thank you to my wife Diane who has fully supported me in my commitment to Maccabi. Finally I would like to thank our professional staff Marc, Arieh, Asher and Suzanne (their articles will let you know about the work they are doing) for their delivery of our education programme and our administrators Cynthia, Valerie and Michelle who manage to keep the office running so smoothly often under immense pressure in view of the enormous workload that is sometimes put on them.

From The National Director

The Jewish Community for the last couple of years has been focused on the issue of *Jewish continuity*. One cannot read Jewish newspaper or attend a Jewish meeting where this term is not encountered. Do we fully understand what we mean when talking about *Jewish continuity*.

The British Jewish community was thrown by the findings that emerged from the United States in 1990 which revealed that 52% of Jews who were married between 1985 and 1990 married non-Jews, that was the bad news, the good news was that the same study showed that day schools, Jewish camps, youth clubs/groups and the Israel experience had a transformational impact on the development of positive Jewish identity. These findings have been mirrored in the British community, again this reflects the communal anxiety that the British Jewish community seems to be threatened with and hence a need for *Jewish continuity*.

The results of these findings acted as a wake up call to Diaspora Jewry, and our community needed to respond, it's avenue for response was to invest in Jewish informal and formal education, in order to enhance positive Jewish identity.

Maccabi Union and our affiliates must be at the forefront of the drive towards positive Jewish identity for young people within our community. Studies show that some strategies are working, summer camps and Israel Tours being two of the success stories, yet we at Maccabi are unable to fill our summer camp and still only send one tour to Israel each year. It is recognised that the intensive mini-community created by these events have transformational effects on those that attend, for some it is the first time that they have experienced a vibrant and exciting Jewish environment.

The Youth Club/Centre is the place where many marginal Jews encounter Jewish life, and it is here that we are able to create another mini-community, based on the techniques, skills and methods of informal Jewish education we should be able to cater for all of the community.

In order for us to be successful in our mission we must first acknowledge that the community needs to strengthen it's ability to recruit, prepare and retain the best Jewish communal professionals, and the

present workers in the field need to take a look at their own skills in order to be effective, this will often mean training and looking at our own knowledge and experience. Maccabi Union in the future, hopes to be able to offer Jewish training experiences relevant to our work in youth clubs/centres to all our affiliates.

Maccabi Union needs to define its strategy, which needs to incorporate the views, concerns and needs of it's affiliates. We must ensure that this strategy incorporates *Jewish continuity* in its widest definition. We are part of the way towards this goal with the Maccabi Mission Statement.

The development of a "healthy mind in a healthy body" is at the forefront of Maccabi ideology. Maccabi affiliates adopt their own individual identities and are at the same time part of the world-wide Maccabi Movement.

Maccabi aims to ensure the survival of the Jewish people through awareness of Jewish identity, culture, heritage and values, and a belief in the centrality of Israel to the Jewish people and the world-wide Maccabi Movement.

Maccabi gives priority to the total development of the individual through the provision of sporting, educational and cultural activities and services.

The past year has seen many changes in the Union, more affiliates have chosen to join, more staff have been employed and the new management team have been working hard. This is not a time to be complacent, but a time for us to pool our rescues, work together and enhance what we do for young people and the communities we serve.

National Shaliach - Arieh Tsilik

Since September Arieh, together with his wife, Dalit, and their two children, Rotem and Alon, have joined the Maccabi team. He is continuing the work that Herzl, Avichay and Tzvikah were involved in and hopes that he will meet everyone involved in Maccabi all over the U.K.

Arieh was born in Haifa and served six years in the IDF as an Intelligence Officer, attaining the rank of Captain. He then went on to study at Tel Aviv University, obtaining a B.A in Political Science and Middle Eastern History and an M.A. in Labour Studies.

Arieh has held various Jewish agency positions within the Student Authority and worked as Co-ordinator of Social and Cultural activities at the Aliya Department. He was also the Director of the Tavor Absorption Centre in Nazareth-Illit. He has spent time as a Shaliach in Russia and Ukraine, encouraging immigrants to go to Israel and was instrumental in persuading British youth and students from other communities to perform volunteer work in that community. He has also worked as a Shaliach for the FZY Youth Movement in the U.K.

Most recently Arieh worked as Director of the Education Department, and was in charge of the ongoing management of the entire education system of Nazareth-Illit, which is known by its success in absorbing immigrants, half of the population of this town were from other countries, mainly from the former Soviet Union and Ethiopia and arrived within the last six years.

Interview with Arieh

Q. What are your views of Maccabi?

A. I see a picture frame which is like a puzzle which is incomplete, which during the time I am here I have to complete this puzzle to be able to see the picture. Maybe, even to become part of this picture, which will include Israel together with Zionism and Jewish Identity.

I see Maccabi Union as an umbrella organisation working in full partnership with Maccabi clubs and fully aware of Israel by sending the members on Israel Tours, Leadership Seminars and Educational events and Programmes regarding Jewish Identity and Zionism.

Everyone associates Maccabi with sport, so I am very aware of this and will try to link my goals with the saying "a healthy mind in a healthy body".

Q. What are your aims whilst you are here?

A. My aim is to visit every Maccabi club in the U.K., to meet and become part of their structure so they feel comfortable enough to phone me at any time. I want to meet people face to face and to share my feelings regarding Israel and the Jewish community now and in the future. I want to bring the Israel spirit to the clubs. It seems to me that the Jewish youth in Maccabi and in Israel have reached a crossroads regarding Jewish identity and approach to Israel as the State of the Jewish people. I would like to feel that I can contribute to help the youth of today question this in a pluralistic way.

Q. What connection did you have with Maccabi?

A. My father, Zvikha, was a leader in Maccabi Hatzair-Gordonia, from Rumania. He still has kept the boxing gloves from the time that he was a leader there. He made Aliyah with his friends from the Movement and settled in a Kibbutz near Gaza, called Nir'Am. From him I learned about values of being Zionistic and proud to be Jewish, in Israel.

In the 13th Maccabiah I was in charge of promoting Aliyah options for the participants throughout the Maccabiah, which involved organising tours and visiting higher Institutes of Education in Israel.

Q. How are you going to promote Zionism?

A. It happens to be the most challenging period because we have two major events planned during my Shlichut. One is the "One Hundred Years of Zionism" (1997) and Fifty Years of Israel Independence (1998). I will build programmes together with the Clubs such as Israel Club Tours and a Maccabi Tour to Europe visiting Jewish places of interest such as in East Europe and Basel. We are also planning, in conjunction with the Zionist Federation, to hold major events in Great Britain.

Together we can reach the same goal and become Shalichim of Israel in the community.

From The Development Director

It is difficult to believe but 18 months have passed since I used to live at Gildesgame House, I still find it strange walking through the doors! Nevertheless I consider myself very lucky to be allowed to continue contributing to the Union's work and am grateful to Henry and the HO's for enabling me to do so. My work with the staff is also very rewarding and I hope that they find my input useful. I continue to try and widen the funding base for the organisation and also help with advice to the HO's and the staff when called upon.

Having stepped back from the day to day work has enabled me to develop a fresh perspective on the issues. Henry's calm and considerate approach, supported by Richard and other key HO's has meant that the painful conflicts that affected the work have largely disappeared. At the same time the Union has continued to build on the successes achieved during Stuart's chairmanship. new staff team led by Marc has also settled in very well. All this means we have now the opportunity to plan for the future from a position of strength. What should we be doing with this opportunity, especially when the rapid expansion has meant the stretching of the financial resources of the Union to the limit? There are no easy answers to this question but I am convinced that we need to become a "lean and mean" organisation. Every activity we undertake must be effective and efficient and compatible with our view of the future. At the same time we cannot go back to being a small organisation. We must be able to punch our weight and have sufficient resources to make an impact in community, worthy of our status. I believe that the following are of the utmost priority.

- 1. Sport: I do not believe that we make enough use of Maccabi's inherent strength in the sports field. The wonderful work, led so competently by Howard Moss and other colleagues and undertaken entirely by volunteers, needs expanding both in terms of the scope of the programme and also the level of penetration into the market. This undoubtedly means a need for additional funding and also the appointment of a Sports Development Officer. The foci should be both on the development of sporting facilities in the clubs (including coaching) and also on reaching out to the community through the open sports policy and the MSA. Myself as well as the other members of the sub-committee for the Development of Sport believe strongly that this is the biggest challenge facing the Union.
- 2. Partnership: Henry rightly always talks about the concept of partnership with the clubs. At times I feel that there is not enough commitment to the concept. I strongly believe that the future lies in a much more cohesive organisation where the strengths of both the clubs and the headquarters organisation are shared to the benefit of all. We need to move towards a much more

equal and open relationship. Kenton, Catford and Glasgow are some of the shining examples for the success of the concept of partnership when properly applied. There is no time for an inflated ego - the challenges facing us and the community are far too great! At the same time I believe that the nature of affiliation should be examined - partnership is a two way relationship with mutual and shared responsibilities. I believe cherry picking to be a very damaging concept!

- 3. Education: We must continue to build on the considerable successes achieved in our educational projects especially the Leadership Programmes, Israel activities and outreach and detached projects. I know that there are many voices out there saying, for example: "Why do we need the Street Project?" The answer, my friends, is that nobody else is doing it! We cannot wash our hands of a piece of work that has been recognised as extremely valuable and innovative. Let's be honest it has not harmed the image of the Union either!
- 4. Image and Funding: Despite the huge rise in the respect for our organisation, and the huge success of "Challenge", there are still far too many people who do not know enough about the range and depth of our operations. I believe this to be a failing on our part (not helped by the community's apathy) and something that impacts on our ability to attract funding. We must continue developing in this area and also use every contact we have to widen our funding base. For example, we have very eminent people involved in the Maccabi Foundation and we must ask for their help to open doors for us - Eric and Beryl Rayman have been magnificent in this respect.I wish to thank you Henry and the HO's, Marc and my colleagues on the staff team and all of my friends for your support and warmth.



Ammunition Hill Memorial Ceremony 16th May 1996

A Memorial Ceremony was held on Ammunition Hill, Jerusalem with the Mayor of Jerusalem Mr. Ehud Olmert, IDF Chief of Staff Major General Amnon Lipkin-Shahak, General (Ret) Uzi Narkiss, IDF Chief Cantor Mr Arieh Brown, Deputy Major of Jerusalem Professor Ariel Cohen and General, Rabbi Gad Navon to coincide with Jerusalem Day and the year long Jerusalem 3000 celebrations.

Seven torches were lit in remembrance of those who fell taking Ammunition Hill and liberated Jerusalem in 1967. Henry Minkoff, Chairman of Maccabi Union Great Britain who was in Israel taking a group of Maccabi Top Leaders to the Maccabi World Union Plenum was honoured to light one of the torches and gave the following address in front of 2000 spectators and guests.

I, Henry Minkoff, Chairman of Maccabi Union Great Britain, am honoured to light this torch in tribute to the hundreds of thousands of Jews who implement the proverb: "a healthy soul in a healthy body". In honour of the many around the world who are active in all fields of sport and youth education. In memory of the victims of persecution against the Jewish people throughout all generations. In memory of the millions of Jews who paid the ultimate price for the dependency upon the nations of the world, until we, their legacy, reached independence.

In honour of the peace process and the bright future that awaits the State of Israel

In honour of the three thousand years of Jerusalem - the City of David, twenty nine years of the city's re-unification. In memory of those who fell in action in defence of the people and the country and the glory of the State of Israel.

Fred Oberlander 1911-1996

Freddie, as he was universally known, was larger than life. As a wrestler you would expect him to be a muscle-bound heavyweight, but to those of us who had the privilege of knowing him ever since he arrived as a young man in England, the largesse was not only physical.

He was one of life's buccaneers, a fearless adventurer, a man of imagination, intolerant of fools, generous to this friends and supremely loyal to Maccabi. He not only preached the benefit of sport but he practised it.

He was born in Vienna during the heydays of Hakoah Wien when that famous club was in the top ranks of European football, swimming, water polo and wrestling. Freddie's great ambition was to become a water polo player. Amongst the tremendous talent then extant in Vienna, he was unfortunately not good enough. Undaunted he turned to wrestling with such determination that he became Austrian champion, French champion during his relatively brief sojourn in Paris where he met his wife, Alice, and British champion. He represented Great Britain during the Olympics and of course became Maccabiah champion and the principle powerhouse for the identification of Jewish sports in Canada with Maccabi.

Freddie wanted quick solutions - not next week, not tomorrow but now! He would bang the desk just like his good friend, also from Vienna, Teddy Kollick.

In London his influence during the post second World War years was considerable. He and I clashed frequently albeit in a friendly fashion. He was sports director of Maccabi Association London. I was the cultural director. We regularly fought over the availability of the gym/meeting hall. He introduced the London Metropolitan Police Team to the wrestling mats of MAL and one of them, a Sgt. Bissel, unhinged my shoulder when foolishly I allowed myself to be prevailed upon by Freddie to "have a go".

His enthusiasm was infectious. He loved the Kfar Maccabiah and was immensely proud of its growth and success. We shall not see the like of him again.

Don't Just Do It.....

"O.K. so let's think of something to do on Christmas Day - we could volunteer at a homeless shelter or... No sorry I can't, we have a festive meal, stay home together and give each other gifts..."

Shocked? I was when I heard this response coming from 'nice Jewish girls and boys' from those youth who are affiliated, go to a Jewish club, keep kosher and some have even been on the Israel Experience tours. "You celebrate Christmas?" I said in shock and their response was just as shocked "No, not CHRISTMAS - Christmas, the commercialised Christmas that you see on TV..."

I must say that my thoughts were "how can I blame them" this is exactly what we heard about in our last shlichim seminar, these kids are a reflection of the community in G.B. Most of the Jewish community in Great Britain today are the third generation Jewish community to the big Jewish Emigration from Eastern Europe that occurred at the beginning of the century. The "first" generation Jews who came to Britain were very religious and committed to their religion and many came to Britain in order to be able to practise their beliefs. Today, three generations later the Jewish community in G.B. has succeeded 'big time'. Jews feel secure - financially and physically and are free to practise their beliefs which is Judaism of course, the Judaism they remember practised by their grandparents. Religion may last three generations but the fourth generation that cannot remember granddad and cannot remember a community practising Judaism but can remember a society celebrating the 'commercialised Christmas' will cease to be Jewish.

Judaism is alive in Britain but some people practise it because they have vague recollections of the way their grandparents practised Judaism. Today many people practise a different form of Judaism, this can be called a 'going through the motions Judaism,' i.e. lighting candles on Shabbat, going to Synagogue on High Holydays etc... We the fourth generation will eventually stop 'going through the motions' because

we will have forgotten or have not been taught the meaning of the 'motions'. We are not committed to Judaism. To commit ourselves we must first understand our Judaism and commit ourselves to learning about Judaism.

Today we see the community facing one of its biggest problems - Assimilation. At the same time we see a move towards a culture of learning and understanding our Judaism,. This is why celebrating Chanukah, which is the story of triumph over assimilation and then celebrating the 'commercialised Christmas' does not make any sense. It cannot however be an individual decision because Judaism is not an individuals religion it is a way of life and a community life at that.

I believe that commitment to Judaism should be a commitment not just to aliyah but to learning and understanding Israel because Israel is the only country in the world where a Jew can be Jew in his home and in the street, at work and at play, while being an employer or being an employee, while giving birth or G-D forbid while getting a liver transplant.

As we celebrate Chanukah we must not forget that another reason for the Maccabi revolt was a desire for self rule (which is a natural desire as people who follow what is happening in Israel may tell you). I will not pretend Israel has no problems, Israeli society is still grappling with the issue of polarisation, between themselves and between Jews and non-Jews, but because it is the Jewish state there is Jewish education and the effort is made to change things.

Maccabi Leadership Tour - 1996

As members of the Maccabi Leadership Tour 1996, we began our journey to Eretz Yisrael on the Exodus boat which led us out of Athens to the Israeli port of Haifa. One of the things that made our tour special and different was the fact that even though we were a small group, our presence was strongly felt and we were respected as one of the major tour groups.

The journey began with a tekes (ceremony) in which a survivor of the Exodus boat that sailed from southern Europe to Palestine in 1947 spoke of his experiences and those of his fellow immigrants who had escaped the horrors of the Holocaust. During the ceremony he passed a torch that represented both the history and the hope for the future to one of the members of our tour.

The purpose of the trip was to attempt to retrace the journey of that famous boat in 1947 and for us to try and understand the history of the event. This was certainly a success.

Upon arrival in Haifa, the EXODUS '96 was welcomed by the Israeli airforce and navy, and Israeli dancers were waiting on the quayside to greet us with singing, dancing and even a red rose each!

The main welcome ceremony was held in Shuni, in the Roman amphitheatre. The atmosphere was electric as everybody who had participated in the exciting three days of the Exodus sang, danced and was treated to a magnificent fireworks display.

Straight from the ceremony we travelled to Jerusalem which was to be our first (and, three weeks later, our last) destination in Israel. This beautiful city was where we gained our first impressions of Israel. We visited many sites in Jerusalem during that week: the old city and the Kotel; the new city and its nightlife; Yad Vashem and even some of the Ultra-Orthodox neighbourhoods.

We visited the Kotel (Western Wall) on two occasions, both proving to be memorable experiences. We all wrote notes to place in the wall and we said some short prayers together before approaching the wall. We were also fortunate to celebrate Kabbalat Shabbat (Shabbat reception) in the old city which was a great feeling. Even the long walk back to our accommodation didn't seem so bad as we were all singing together in a joint celebration of the arrival of Shabbat.

Yad Vashem was one of - if not - the most emotional experiences of the Israel Tour. the museum was informative but harrowing and the Children's Memorial was heart wrenching and moving. Certain members of our group had grandparents and great grandparents who had suffered at the hands of the Nazis and this made it an especially difficult time for them and brought the experience of the Shoah closer to home for the rest of us. Before leaving Yad Vashem we visited the Hall of Remembrance and held a tekes during which two members of our group laid a wreath on behalf of Maccabi Union in front of the eternal flame that burns there.

Later that day there was a complete change of mood as we participated in the Youth and Hechalutz "Event". This is a huge gathering of all Israel Tours organised by the Youth and Hechalutz division of the Jewish Agency. In total over 5,000 young Jewish people from all over the world marched through the streets of Jerusalem to arrive at the Sultan's Pool in front of the Old City - surely one of the most fantastic venues for a party! A great show was put on by members of various Israel Tours as well as young Israelis and (again) we sang and danced well into the night.

We left Jerusalem at the end of a wonderful week and travelled North to the Galil and the Golan. We spent quite a lot of time learning about the area by hiking, touring, visiting places and speaking to local people. We discovered the beauty of the Galil and Golan, with its marvellous waterfalls and spectacular landscape. We walked through the narrow, winding streets of Tzfat visiting its synagogues. We visited kibbutzim and learnt about this very unique way of life that played such an important role in the founding of the state of Israel. We visited Druze and Arab villages and met with the local people to discuss their views on Israel, the peace progress and also how they perceived us - Jewish tourists from outside of Israel.

We also managed to squeeze in some light relief such as kayaking down the Jordan river (AMAZING) and swimming in the Kinneret.

We left the north and travelled to the Tel-Aviv area where we all went to stay either with family and friends or with families of Maccabi Tzair. This was a fantastic weekend that gave us all a chance to really get inside Israeli culture and society - and to get away from the rest of the group for a couple of days!

Upon returning from that weekend we set off straight away to the south. Despite the intense heat the pace didn't relax. We hiked in Ein Gedi, swam (floated) in the Dead Sea, climbed Massada at 4am and spent a night in a Bedouin tent.

Surely the most challenging but exciting part of the southern trip was the climbing of Massada. After a tough climb we were rewarded by an unforgettable sight - the sun rising over the hills of Jordan and reflecting off the Dead Sea in front of us. Simply breathtaking.

The Bedouin hospitality was most interesting and whilst their food was great the camel ride left all of us a touch sore and made sitting rather uncomfortable for a couple of hours afterwards!!

The end of the southern trip brought us to our final Shabbat of the Tour and our movement seminar in Kfar HaMaccabiah.

WOW! What a place. Being at the Kfar and seeing the complex made us all feel very proud to be part of Maccabi. During the seminar we visited the Maccabi museum and were joined by members of Maccabi Tzair, our sister movement in Israel. It was a great experience to spend a Shabbat learning about Maccabi

with people who are from a different, yet similar, Maccabi background.

We of course fitted in a few trips to the swimming pools as well as visiting Ramat Gan after Shabbat to mix with the locals in the large shopping centre.

Our Tour then moved in to the 'final furlong' as we returned to Jerusalem for our Hadracha (Leadership) seminar. Three packed days of learning and creativity provided us all with plenty of ideas to bring back to our clubs the knowledge and experiences that we had gained in Israel.

At the start of the Tour, each member of the group had set a personal goal for the three weeks. Everyone seemed to have achieved these goals and whilst these were only personal goals, the group was such a close one that many became group aims that we all worked together to achieve.

The group had bonded well and we had formed long-lasting friendships. On the last night of the Tour we went to Tayelet and looked out for the last time over the whole of Jerusalem. It was a reflective time for all of us and to say that it was emotional would be an understatement. We had come to the end of three and a half weeks that can never be fully described. We had learnt, travelled, played, sunbathed, argued, laughed, cried and one or two had got sunburnt! The fact was though, that we had done everything together and every memory is a shared one.

Thank you Maccabi for this outstanding opportunity. We will never forget it.

Goodbye

Of course there were other problems, but this seemed to be the major one which has been tackled this year, and dare I say quite successfully.

I wish any Shaliach in any club to receive the same treatment that I have been greeted with by both my fellow leaders, led by the indestructible (though sometimes bashful) Stephen Low, and my Senior council, held together firmly (but with some magnificent haircuts) by Doreen Minster. Taking the approach of not holding back anything that can be channelled into the youth sections, the management of Glasgow Maccabi enabled me to do practically anything I thought right. As far as they were concerned, this was what I was here to do and there is no point in holding me back. For this I am truly grateful.

One of the major achievements of Maccabi this year was establishing this club as a community focal point. Given the fact that the Community Shaliach was not replaced in August, Glasgow Maccabi assumed many responsibilities that were usually his Since then, more community activities were either initiated, hosted or held under the auspices of the club. A very important fact that was acknowledged here is that anything that was good for the community, is good for Maccabi. indeed this is the case now. A lot of credit is given to this establishment today, for things that weren't identified with Maccabi before. A prime example is informal education. I know that other clubs have the same problem - they are not recognised as being an informal education organisation. Last year there was one section running for 5-8 years. It took a

great deal of effort and sometimes courage to take this on, but it was a good section. Today there are three sections running at full capacity, this is definitely due to the leaders' hard work. However sometimes, when building the parents' confidence, other aspects of the club need to be taken into consideration and when they realise that again and again they find themselves at Maccabi, or see its name identified as a centre of leadership, they give it more and more credit with taking care of their children.

This scheme involves a wide variety of youth groups nationwide (170 of them) in producing 12 new plays especially commissioned for young people by the National Theatre. It culminates in a regional showcase at the Riverside Studios. 12 productions will be chosen from amongst the 170 to perform at the National Theatre in July 1977. The play we have chosen to do is The Chrysalids by David Harrower adapted from a novel of the same name by John Wyndham. The 22 young people that make up Le'an? this year (17 girls and 5 boys) have taken a leading role in the process of making the choice of play. The play is brilliant and offers a lot of scope for exploration both educationally and theatrically. (As to the exact content of the play... well, you'll just have to wait and see!!).

I believe that Le'an?'s involvement in this scheme marks a major step forward which will enable the project to expand its activities, whilst accessing a wider and more diverse audience. MACCABI GREAT BRITAIN BAG A STASH OF MEDALS IN USA

The Maccabi Great Britain team returned victorious from the JCC Maccabi Youth Games held in Whippany, New Jersey, USA.

Aside from the sporting competition, the group of youngsters enjoyed spending this time with Jewish teens from all over the world and from very different backgrounds. Firm friendships have been forged, against a background of camaraderie and team spirit. During the first few days we were hosted by the wonderful community Southern of Jersey, Philadelphia where we were entertained and swiftly became a part of their own Maccabi group of athletes. The activities included a day at their Summer camp, and a trip to the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia.

The JCC Maccabi Games, largely sponsored by Coca Cola, brought together more than 2,200 Jewish teens aged between 13 and 16 years, from every part of the USA, Canada, Israel, Australia, and Great Britain.

In order to host the event, the Jewish community of Metrowest, had to enlist huge numbers of volunteers, including close to one thousand host families in the area.

The whole experience was unforgettable; we took a great group of youngsters who performed brilliantly on and off the field.

The outstanding GB athlete was, without doubt, 14 year old Sophie Koehne who collected 5 individual and 4 relay gold medals in the Track and Field competition. Sophie, by nature a modest character, was clearly thrilled by her performance, winning all the individual and relay events for which she was entered, all by large margins. Her wins included the 2.5 mile cross country event; a distance at which she took second place recently in the London Minimarathon.

GB Track manager Colin Rosen was delighted with his squad's success taking first overall team place in the track competition.

Golf, always a strong competition generated two silver medals; Nicky Harris, in the Junior individual event, and Jay Aaronson, and Ricky Forman in the team event. This was a real achievement considering the quality of the American players in the Championships.

Table Tennis too fared extremely well, outplaying the opposition in every event. Mark Freyd took 4 golds, Steven Gooblar, three, and Sarah Shephard, two. In addition, Teddy Liefer and Sacha Wilson took a gold a piece in the doubles. Donna Greenberg and Neil Phillips also picked up medals including a team gold.

Only Tennis faced stronger opposition, despite a spirited performance by Anna Gilford who made it through to the final round. Their lack of medals does not do their standard of play justice as all the players fought their matches skilfully and with good sportsmanship. Jamie Byder was unlucky to only lose one match in a long tie-break, whilst team mate James Milton also won three out of his four matches.

The whole programme was a huge challenge and one that I believe all members of the group responded to admirably.

A 14 player squad and 19 supporters from Brady Maccabi, Edgware, flew from a sunny 21 degrees at Luton Airport to an overcast, cold Glasgow Maccabi to challenge for the John Rubens National Cup Final on Sunday 21st April 1996. Glasgow Maccabi's hospitality was superb and the team and supporters were warmly welcomed.

Due to torrential rain, all stadiums were called off so the game was played on Glasgow's second pitch, on top of a hill by the side of the club. Support for the home side was huge as this was the first time that Glasgow had reached the final of the John Rubens cup.

Playing in the now famous new short sleeve blue/green kit, Brady dominated the game from the start, with Michael Woolf and Jason Cohen penetrating the defence from the wings. Brady kept the pressure on, with the best chances of the half coming to Craig Salber who ran the ball 50 yards only to screw his shot wide and Danny Simons who put the ball in the net only to have it ruled off side.

The best chance of the half for Glasgow fell to Daniel Hecht who latched onto a long ball but his chip over the advancing keeper, David Fox, flew over the bar.

The second half saw Brady increase the tempo of the game and with the wind behind them they kept pounding at the Glasgow goal. Glasgow's keeper, Peter Marco pulled off some superb athletic saves from Richard Wallis, Danny Daggers, Sammy Carr and Danny Simons. Brady made their 3 substitutions in quick succession and pushed Adam Levene into the centre of midfield, but again it was Jason Cohen who set up Brady's second. Robert and Jason again teamed up, Jason fought off two challenges, sent over a teasing ball into the box for substitute Joel Sharp to head in from close range.

The third came from the penalty spot. Again it was Star man Jason Cohen who, with the bit between his teeth, took the ball round two Glasgow defenders only to be brought down inside the box. Sammy Carr blasted the penalty past Peter Marco, to take his goal tally for the season to 31.

All credit to Glasgow, they kept battling and only a fine save from David Fox kept them from coming back into the game. However, in the 78th minute, Glasgow were awarded a penalty when Brady's captain Craig Salber was shown the red card for a challenge inside the box. Only a superb save from Fox, diving low to this left, prevented Glasgow getting a consolation goal.

Maurice Weitzman presented the cup and medals to Brady during a wonderful meal laid on by Glasgow Maccabi for both teams and supporters. He said "Although there has to be a winning team and a losing team, Maccabi football is also a winner today with both teams being a credit to their respective clubs. Mark Goldberg, Brady's team manager said after the game, "The boys were magnificent, this was an excellent display of character and football, we are all proud of what the squad achieved today.

Water Polo

The Maccabi Water Polo team have continued to compete in local and Cup Competitions with mixed success. The results have in the main reflected the availability (or otherwise) of key players some of whom have now gone on to university and are not always available for selection.

MACCABI ARE BASKETBALL CHAMPIONS - 1996



The 15th Maccabiah - by Stuart Lustigman

"A remarkable ingathering of all our people - a Jewish sporting jamboree for all ages and, even more importantly, for all levels of ability and disability which strengthens Judaism across the globe and reinforces the centrality of Israel to Jewish life. Long live the Jewish people. Long live the Maccabiah." This quote from the Jerusalem post 18th July 1993 was how I concluded my report in the souvenir brochure following the 14th Maccabiah.

Here we are some four years later on the brink of the 15th Maccabiah which will herald the beginning of a year long celebration of the 50th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. The Maccabiah flame was truly burning in the minds and hearts of those early pioneers whose blood, sweat and tears enabled the vision of a State of Israel to become reality.

It is hard to believe that 53 Countries have indicated their interest in participating in the Games. Can it really be that Jewish athletes will arrive in Israel representing Aruba, Costa Rica, Croatia, Ecuador, Korea, Panama and Zimbabwe? Can you imagine in the height of the summer that Canada, USA and Israel will be competing for medals in Ice Hockey! Or that competitors from Austria, Canada, Switzerland and Israel will be Figure Skating! And if that all seems 'Alice in Wonderland', how about Great Britain slugging it out with the likes of Argentina, Mexico, USA and Venezuela in the - (wait for it) - SOFTBALL event.



Babe, We Were Born to Run

"We gotta get out while we're young
'Cos tramps like us, babe we were born to run"
Bruce Springsteen (1975)

That's me folks. Born to run. Which is just as well as that's all I was ever any good at in my formative years. Sport in general, athletics in particular. Hence 25 years after playing football in my first European Maccabi Games, 10 years after kicking my last ball in earnest in the headache-inducing maelstrom of Jewish football, and just a few short months after reaching an age when the athletics authorities suggested I'd seen active service in Vietnam - they called me a veteran - I found myself at the real thing, running for the old red, white and blue at the 14th World Maccabiah Games.

1993 was destined to be a good year on the sporting front in this little corner of Edgware. My son's Kinnor team were to win the first of three (so far!) successive Maccabi league and cup doubles, my Luton team were to do the double over Liverpool (much good it did us - we still went down!), and your humble correspondent was to march proudly into 'Ramat Gan's capacity-filled national stadium wearing Armani shades, a huge smile, and a national costume that can have been designed only by a colour blind alcoholic on Prozac!

The shirt excepted - and believe me, if you were there you'll know what I mean - the Games presented me with one of the most memorable fortnights of my life. I treasure my sport and my Jewishness and to combine the two in the company of 5,000 other athletes from around the world was both physically and spiritually uplifting, not least the sight of all those vibrant Jews, some black from Ethiopia, some brown from Bolivia, some iridescent under unfamiliar sun-rays, standing together at the floodlit Sultan's Pool in Jerusalem, *chanukiot* shot by laser into the outer walls of the Old City,

frantically trading T-shirts and kit bags. This was true egalitarian market-place Judaism. Trade first, *daven* later.

As a former Jerusalem resident, being stationed for two weeks in downtown Tel Aviv was like a breath of fresh air. Yes, Tel Aviv is little more than Margate with attitude, Hayarkon Street fairly drowning in a cacophony of car horns, car exhausts, and car stereos blaring out naff 70's music courtesy of a thousand and one timewarped, Abba-obsessed natives. But it's so alive, and the prospect of turning in early after a hard day on the track just doesn't wash. The beach at night is just that little bit too seductive.

The Games themselves were a revelation, certainly so far as athletics is concerned, where the standard, whilst far from uniformally excellent, was much higher than I had expected. Eight metre long jumpers, two metre 30 high jumpers, and a young *falasha* called Yosef - now a star turn for his adopted Canada - who is a three minute 52 second miler. Top notch by any standards, I'd say.

Not so in every sport, admittedly. In swimming, alas, no Mark Spitz this year. Not even a Robert Maxwell. But the range of sports was admirable, from rhythmic gymnastics all the way to Greco-Roman wrestling. Surprisingly, though, the Lubavitch didn't send their synchronised shockelling squad to spread the good word. That said, rabbinical presence was felt in one of the quirkier by-products of the Games, a mass barmitzvah ceremony atop Massada for hitherto "unconfirmed" contestants of dubious Jewishness. Nice idea, if not wholly appreciated by those souls of less open minds.


Administratively, what can I say? A Jewish affair, naturally, as witness the half-marathon, which was run over a course so undulating and in such intense heat that an evening spent with OJ Simpson, a pair of gloves, and a set of garden shears might have seemed preferable. And *noch*, they had on four occasions to traverse the main Tel Aviv-Jerusalem highway. Now, Israeli drivers stop for no-one at the best of times, so what chance 150 kamikaze Hebrews in search of a cold drink and a fluffy sponge?

As a sprinter, the whole concept of marathon racing is anathema to me. I mean, what with the wonders of modern transportation, why *run* those sort of distances? Why buy the latest Mercedes SLK only to run the equivalent of King's Langley to Luton and back again? It's quite beyond me, but I do so admire this peculiar breed of athlete for whom the words *glutton and punishment* are clearly destined to occupy the same sentence.

The high point of the Games? Curiously, not the sport itself - though certainly I thoroughly enjoyed the competition. No. Winning a medal was a bonus, the icing on the cherry cheese cake. The real high point, though, was being there, feeling, breathing, almost touching the *ruach*, the spirit, that permeated this festival not only of sport, but of Jewishness. To share my Shabbat dinner with Freddie from Costa Rica, Dima from Latvia, David from Hong Kong, (yes, Hong Kong, and I've got his T-shirt to prove it!), and Ruthie from Cape Town - that's what it's all about. A common passion and a common heritage shared under a blazing sun to the strains of *Yerushalayim Shel Zahav*.

Alas, the Maccabiah comes but once every four years, the next being just a matter of months away. Those of you who have competed in past *Maccabiot* will not have needed reminding by me of the wonders and joy of what is often referred to as The Jewish Olympics. Those selected for the first time, the best is yet to come. Nothing I say can prepare you for what is indisputably a perfectly unique, and uniquely perfect, experience. Enjoy!
